*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,*

WE are desirous of appointing a council to the governor, and therefore propose to go into the election this day at twelve o'clock. Messrs. Reverdy Ghiselin, James Butcher, John Stephen, Thomas W. Hall and George E. Mitchell, are put in nomination by this house. We have appointed Mr. Lloyd Dorsey and Mr. Shriver, in conjunction with such gentlemen as you may appoint, to examine the ballots.

Which was read.

The speaker laid before the house a letter from the clerk of Anne-Arundel county court, relative to the attendance of the judges thereof; which was read and referred to the committee of grievances and courts of justice.

The bill to give validity and operation to the deeds of conveyance therein mentioned, the bill to settle and ascertain the salary of the members of the council for the ensuing year, the bill for the relief of Elizabeth Fling, of Allegany county, the bill to give validity to a deed from Robert Gilla Hampton to William Gilbert, the bill for the relief of Elizabeth Coale, of Baltimore county, the bill respecting the registering of marriages, births and deaths, the bill to lay out and make public a road in Anne-Arundel county, the bill authorising Isaac S. White, late sheriff and collector of Washington county, to complete his collection, the bill authorising the benefit of the infant children of James Wilson Perry, of Montgomery county, deceased, the bill for the lease the right of the state to a part of a tract of land therein mentioned, the bill for the further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to confirm and make public a certain road therein mentioned, the bill for the release the right of the state to a part of a tract of land therein mentioned, the bill for the support of William Clarke, and his helpless family, of Worcester county, the bill to authorise Hannah A. Hayes, guardian of the heirs at law of Stephen Hayes, deceased, to convey certain lands therein mentioned, lying in Cæcil county, the bill for the benefit of the people in Kent county called Quakers, the bill for the relief of Oliver R. Howell, of the state of Delaware, and the resolutions in favour of Edward Wingate, William Dawson and Frederick Green, were sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Groome, the following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the senate:

THE honourable Edward Lloyd, Esquire, having been elected governor of the state of Maryland, we have appointed Mr. Groome and Mr. Gardiner, jointly with such gentlemen as shall be named by your house, to wait upon the governor, and request his attendance in the senate room to qualify according to the constitution and form of government.

WE have received your message, appointing on your part Mr. Groome and Mr. Gardiner to wait on the governor elect, and request his attendance in the senate chamber to qualify agreeably to the constitution and form of government, and on our part we have nominated Mr. Glenn and Mr. Fenwick to join the members appointed by your house for that purpose.

Which was read.

Mr. T. Dorsey and Mr. Bowie, from the senate, acquaint the speaker, that the governor elect is attending in the senate room, and the senate request his attendance, with the members of the house of delegates, in the senate room, to see the governor qualify.

The speaker left the chair, and, attended by the members of this house, went to the senate room, where his excellency qualified in the presence of both houses, by subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian religion, by taking the several oaths required by the constitution and form of government, the oath of office directed by act of assembly, and by taking the oath to support the constitution of the United States.

The speaker, attended by the members of this house, returned and resumed the chair.

On motion by Mr. Swearingen, the following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the senate:

By the H O U S E of D E L E G A T E S, November 19, 1810.

*Gentlemen of the Senate,*

WE have received your message, and agree to proceed immediately to the election of a council to the governor, and have appointed Mr. Swearingen and Mr. M'Pherson to join the gentlemen named in your message in the examination of the ballots. No person is named by this house in addition to those nominated by you.
