

The house resumed the consideration of the resolution relative to the United States Bank, and, on motion by Mr. Brooke, the question was put, That the following be inserted in lieu of the preamble stricken out?

“Whereas it is the opinion of the legislature of the state of Maryland, that the congress of the United States in having passed the law for the establishment of the Bank of the United States, transcended the powers vested in that legislative body by the constitution of the United States, and thereby entrenched upon the sovereignty and independency of the several state governments: And whereas it is also the opinion of this legislature, that the power of establishing a national bank, by a law of the United States, is not expressly given to congress by any section, article or provision, in the constitution of the United States, nor necessarily incident to any power expressly given to congress by that constitution; and this legislature conceiving it to be their bounden duty to oppose, by all legal and constitutional means, any attempt by the congress of the United States to pass any law, the effect and operation whereof would be to extend the powers of the general government beyond their constitutional limits, or to abridge the constitutional rights of the individual, therefore.”
