

An act to incorporate the Elkton and Susquehanna Bridge Turnpike Company; severally endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments."

The amendments proposed by the senate to the first mentioned bill were severally read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table. And the amendments proposed by the senate to the last mentioned bill were read the first, and by a special order the second time, and severally assented to. Also,

An act for the revaluation of the real and personal property in Calvert county; endorsed, "will pass."

Whereupon it was Ordered, That the two last mentioned bills be severally engrossed.

And delivered a bill, originated in, and passed by, the senate, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act for amending and reducing into system, the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, the duties of executors, administrators, and guardians, and the rights of orphans, and other representatives of deceased persons; which was read by its title, and referred to a select committee of three members, consisting of Messrs. Goldsborough, Tilghman, and Thomas of Frederick.

Mr. Rogerson asked and obtained permission to withdraw the papers and documents accompanying the petition of Richard Nagle, of Cambria county, Pennsylvania, presented by Mr. Ely on the fourth instant.

The report of the committee on grievances and courts of justice, to whom was referred the petition of Washington Hall, of Cecil county, praying for relief from certain suits instituted by the state against him as terretenant of certain lands lying in said county, delivered on the 11th instant, was taken up for consideration, and read the second time; the report was concurred in, and the resolution therein contained, assented to, and sent to the senate for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Sellman, the house proceeded to the consideration of the resolution relative to the records of certain papers and proceedings in the court of chancery, submitted by him on the eighth instant, and, being read the second time, it was assented to, and sent to the senate for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Gantt, the house proceeded to the consideration of the bill, reported by him on the sixth instant, as amended by the committee to whom it had been recommended for that purpose, entitled, An act relative to the inspection of tobacco; and in the progress of the second reading thereof,

Mr. Hughes of Montgomery, moved to amend the bill, by inserting, after the words, "and if sold the nett proceeds thereof in money," in the 8th line of the 3rd section, the following: "and the owner or owners shall have judgment
