

Professors, their immolument; the number, names, places of residence and general course of instruction of the students; and the price of tuition; being referred by the Senate to the consideration of this house.

Which report, with the accompanying document, was referred to the committee on Education.

On motion by Mr. Grason,

The House then proceeded to consider the bill reported by him, as Chairman of the committee on Ways and Means, entitled, "an act to provide for the collection of the Public Revenue." And in the progress of the second reading thereof,

On motion by Mr. Grason the said bill was amended in its fourth section, by striking out the words 'by the debtor or his agent,' in the 14th line of said section, printed bill.

Mr Hicks then moved to reconsider and amend the said second section of the bill, by striking out 'three' in the last line of that section, and inserting in lieu thereof 'six.'

Determined in the negative.

The bill being read throughout and placed in the hands of the Speaker, the question was put, 'shall this bill pass as amended?'

It was resolved in the affirmative; and the bill was then sent to the Senate for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Steele, the bill reported by Mr Grason, as chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means, entitled, an additional supplement to the act of December session, 1827, chap. 117, entitled, an act to regulate the issuing of licenses to traders, keeper of ordinaries, and others, was made the order of the day for to-morrow.

The bill reported by Mr. Hunt, from the Committee on Inspections, entitled an act to make transcripts from the books of inspectors of tobacco, legal evidence in the courts of this state, was taken up for consideration in just turn, and read the second time; when,

On motion by Mr. Brawner, the said bill was amended in its second section, by striking therefrom the proviso, contained in these words:

"Provided, That nothing in this act contained shall be construed to deprive a party of his right to subpoena duces tecum, directed to the inspector, requiring him to bring in-to court his original book of entries."

The bill was then passed, and sent to the Senate for concurrence.
