Mr. Pearce reported a bill entitled, An act to lay out and make a public road in Kent county.

Mr. Parran reported a bill entitled, An act to authorise the recording of a deed therein mentioned;

And, Mr. Wilson, of Cecil, reported a bill entitled, A further additional supplement to an act entitled, An act to incorporate a company for the purpose of cutting and making a canal between the river Delaware and the Chesapeake bay, passed at November session, 1799, chapter 16.

Which said bills were severally read.
