By the Senate,

March 9, 1832.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have rejected the resolution passed by your honorable body, in favour of Elizabeth Barrow, widow of William Barrow, because we understand that the securities of said William object to granting the indulgence proposed to be given by the resolution. We will assent to a resolution on condition said resolution meets with the assent of the securities authorising the Chancellor or Dorchester county court to appoint the trustees for the sale of the land of said William Barrow's estate, to be sold under the Chancellors direction, or the county court of Dorchester, and in manner as shall be deemed most advantageous for all concerned—and the proceeds of sale to be applied to the States claim, and no execution shall issue or be proceeded on against the land to be issued on account of the States claim.

Also, the bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Cecil County Rail Road Company, severally endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were severally read the first and second time by special order, assented to, and the bills ordered to be engrossed;

And, delivered a bill originated in and passed by the Senate, entitled, An act relating to the grade of the square of Washington Monument, in the city of Baltimore; which was read and referred to Messrs. Hunt, Laurenson, and Fly.
