

Mr. Johnson presented a petition of sundry citizens of Frederick and Baltimore counties, praying that a law may pass, to authorize the making of a road as therein set forth; which was read and referred to Messrs. Johnson, Worthington and Hammond;

Also, presented a petition of sundry citizens of Fredericktown, in Frederick county, praying a donation to a female free school; which was read and referred to the committee on education.

Mr. Grove presented a petition of sundry citizens of Washington county, counter to the memorial of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, relative to water power;

And Mr. Powell presented a memorial and petition of sundry citizens of Worcester and Somerset counties, praying that an act may pass, to authorize the appointment of commissioners, and the employment of an Engineer, to survey the route from Salisbury to the waters of the Potomoke river, in Worcester county, with a view to the construction of a Rail Road thereon; which were severally read and referred to the committee on internal improvements.

Mr. Hope presented a petition of sundry citizens of Baltimore and Harford counties, praying for a law for the erection of a bridge over the Little Falls of Gunpowder, at or near Baldwin's mill; which was read and referred to the committee already appointed on that subject

Mr. Lantz presented a petition of sundry stockholders of the Cumberland Bank of Allegany, praying that the charter of the Bank may not be revived or extended; which was read and referred to the consideration of the Senate.
