

On motion by Mr. Harper, the house took up for consideration the resolution, submitted by him, relative to appropriating the sum of three hundred dollars annually, in addition to the annual appropriation, for the gradual augmentation of the State Library;

The said resolution was then read the second time, and assented to;

The unfavorable report of the committee on divorcees, upon the petition of John Walgamot of Washington county, praying to be divorced from his wife Julianna Walgamot, was taken up for consideration, read the second time, and concurred in.

The report of the committee on Lotteries, in obedience to an order requiring them to enquire into the necessity and practicability of dispensing with the services of a part of the Lottery Commissioners, was taken up for consideration, and read the second time.

Mr. Jenkins offered as a substitute for said report, the following resolution:—

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That from and after the expiration of the year 1833, there shall be but one Lottery Commissioner appointed.

And be it further resolved, That the duties now required to be performed by the three commissioners, shall be in all respects performed by the one commissioner, who may be hereafter appointed.

Which was read.

On the question being put, will the house adopt the substitute?

It was resolved in the affirmative.

The said resolution was then read the second time, and assented to.

On motion by Mr. Duvall of Anne Arundel, the yeas and nays were ordered, and appeared, as follows—Yeas 26, Nays 19.
