The Clerk of the Council delivered the following communication from the Executive,

Executive Department,
Annapolis, February 10, 1836.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

In compliance with your order of yesterday requesting me to report to you "whether any report was ever made to the Executive under the resolution of 1825, authorising a revision of the laws, and if made, by whom such report was made, with a copy of the same, also what amount of money has been expended by the Executive under that resolution, or the resolution passed at the session of 1831, and numbered 79, when, for what, and to whom such money was paid, and whether full compensation had not been made by the Executive for all services rendered by those engaged in the revision of the laws prior to the passage of the resolution No. 63, at December session 1834, and whether since then any additional compensation has been made under the above named resolutions, or any of them, and if so, to what amount, for what service, and to whom paid."—I have the honor to state, that it appears from the records of the Executive, that in the annual message of January 1st, 1834, the Legislature was informed that two hundred dollars had been paid to James Raymond, Esq. and the same sum to Littleton D. Teackle, Esq. in full for their services in superintending the printing of the report upon the Digest of the Laws; that a copy of a communication, or report, to the Executive, by Judge Buchanan and Reverdy Johnson, Esqrs. who had been appointed revisers under the resolution of 1825, was communicated with that message, and that other information was therein given in relation to the revision.—The payments to Messrs. Raymond and Teackle, mentioned in said message, were made by orders on the Treasury dated the 19th day of August, 1833. On the 17th day of August, 1835, an order on the Treasury was passed in favour of Judge Buchanan and Reverdy Johnson, Esqrs. for three thousand dollars in full compensation for their services, including those of James Raymond, Esq. their assistant as revisors, and an order on the Treasury for two hundred and ninety-seven dollars was, on the same day, passed in favour of Jeremiah Hughes, Esq. for printing so much of the work as had been printed
