Mr. Beam presented a report of William O. Neal, late sheriff of Montgomery county, shewing the amount of money paid into the Treasury of the Western Shore of Maryland, for the year 1833,

The Speaker laid before the House, a report of R. R. Waters, sheriff of Montgomery county, relative to the several sums of money paid by him into the Western Shore Treasury, within the year ending on the 30th of November,

Mr. Pratt presented a memorial of Reverdy Johnson, praying indemnity for the destruction of his property, in the city of Baltimore, by a mob in August 1835,
