Mr. Duvall presented a memorial of sundry citizens of Frederick county, praying for a law to authorise the calling a convention, to alter and amend the constitution of this State,

Which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Brown obtained leave to bring in a bill, in relation to weighing hay and straw, in the city of Baltimore,

Ordered, That Messrs. Brown, Boyd, and McMahan, report the same.

Mr. McLean obtained leave to bring in a bill supplementary to an act limiting and defining the jurisdiction of justices of the peace &c. passed December session 1834, chapter 296,

Ordered, That Messrs. Annan, Dulaney and Wharton, report the same,

On motion of Mr. Darby,

Ordered, That the committee appointed on the 5th inst. to repair to the city of Baltimore, for the purpose of enquiring into the expediency of erecting a new tobacco inspection warehouse on the public ground in said city, be enlarged by the appointment of two additional members,

In pursuance whereof, the speaker appointed Messrs. Duvall and Burchenal, on said committee.

Ordered, That the select committee to whom was referred the report of the trustees of the University of Maryland, be discharged from the consideration of that subject,
