not in Suffex; and for what he professed as to Religion, he had it not to feek many years before he was Prilinet: Job 13. 4. But ye are Forgers of Lyes, ye ar all Phisicians of no value. Plal. 58 3. The wicked are estranged from the womb, they go ustray as soon as they be born, speaking lies. Plal. 169. 2. For the Mouth of the wicked, and the Mouth of the deceifful are opened against me: they have speken against me with a Lying Tongue. Jer. 7. 8. Behold, fe trust in lying words that cannot, profit. Jonah 2.8. They that observe lying vanieies, forfake their own Mercy.

An Abstrast of several Letters from William Renn Proprietary of Pensilvania, to P.F. &c. Dated at Upland, Nov. 1. and from West-River, Decemb. 16, Mary land, 1682.

That of November 1. 1682, signifying his fase Arrival, and that day six weeks they lost fight of Land in England, they saw it in from the Coast, the Air smell'd as sweet as a Gardennew blown. As they Sail'd up the River they received Visits and Invitations from the Inhabitants, the People being joyful to fee him, both Dutch, Swedes and English coming up to, New-Castle, they received and entertained him with great expressions of joy, after their fort.

. Next day after his Arrival, he had the People summon'd together to the Court-house at: Men-Castle, where possession was legally given him; and after that he made as speech to the old Magistrates, and the People, fignifying to them the End of his coming, the Nature and End of Government, and that especially he came to Establish, assuring them of their Spiritual and Temporal Rights, Liberty of Conference and Civil Freedoms: All he pray'd, expected or required, was Sobriety and loving Neighbour-hood; then he renewed their Commillions and so lest them. He went from thence to a place called Upland, where he called an Assembly, and gave them as ample fatisfaction as at New-Castle, so they Signed an Acknowledgment, and were very Joylul: the Swedes lent one Captain Lacy Cock to acquaint him, They would Serve, Love the best Day they ever law.

The City of Philadelphia is laid out and begun, and many pretty Houses are run up of late apon the River and backwards, that do very well. An House for W. Penn is a Building, whose Family that went with him, are all come fafe; and Entertainment for all, beyond expe-Station, and to their content. The Air is ex-

From West-River, Mary-land, Decemb. 1682. he writes that an Assembly was held at Chister, Eslias Opland, where New-Castle was annex'd to Penfilvania: The Forraigners were Naturaliz'd, and all the Laws past that were agreed upon in England, and more fully worded. The Affembly-men were there to their great fatisfa-Ation, and fuch an Affembly for Love, Unity and Concord, scarcely ever was known in and about outward things in those Parts.

This done they Adjourn'd; and W. Penn America: and being about twelve Leagues off took his Journey for Many land, where he was kindly received by the Lord Baltemore, and the Chief in his Province: They Treated at one Col. Taylors, about setting the bounds between their Provinces: And a folid Conference they had, perparatory to a future Conclusion, the season permitting no long Essays or Treaties. They Civilly parted after two Days Conference.

The day following the Lord Baltemore accompanied him to W. Richardfons, which was a miles, and then returned: They went two miles farther, to one Tho. Hookers, to a Meeting, wherethe presence of the great God was enjoyed with them.

The First day following he intended to be at Choptank on the Eastern Shore; where the Co-Toncis, Magistrates and People of Several Ranks

and Qualities purposed to be.

There are several other reports I have been Inquifitive to find out the Anthors of, and I find them all arise from the same ground with the before mentioned.
