## REMARKS, &c.

HE Right of an Individual to animadvert upon public Measures, has never been controverted, in a free Government, but by the Enemies of Liberty, and the Patrons of Corruption. " I enjoy this er great Privilege (says a political Writer) by " being born in a free Government, that, as a " private Man, I am not accountable to the great-" est Man in the State for my Actions; but the " greatest Man in the State, in a public Station, is accountable to me." And it is very well observed, by another Writer of the same Class, " that every Man who enjoys Property hath some " Share in the Public, and therefore the Care of " the Public is, in some Degree, every such "Man's Concern." As this Right therefore, I presume, will hardly be contested by any but those whom I should be proud to see my Opponents, I shall make no Apology for the Task I have undertaken. The Subject of the following Remarks is, I conceive, of too interesting a Nature to pass entirely unnoticed; and the Practice I shall endeavour to expose, may, in its Consequences, be so extremely injurious, not only to a particular Sett of Men, but to the Province in general, that I think it high Time to give some Check to it, by convincing the Authors, that although
