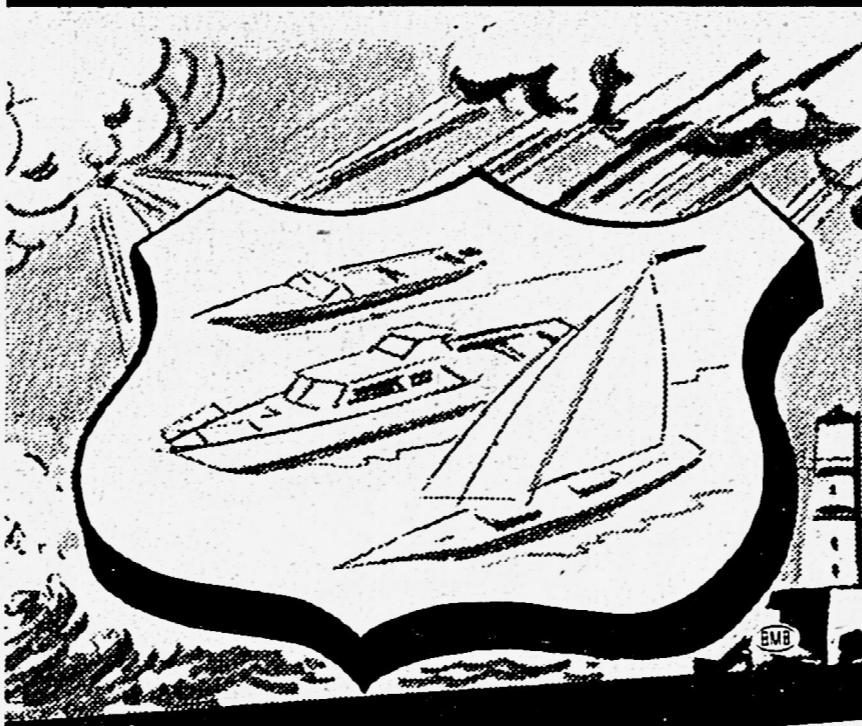


TEE and GREEN

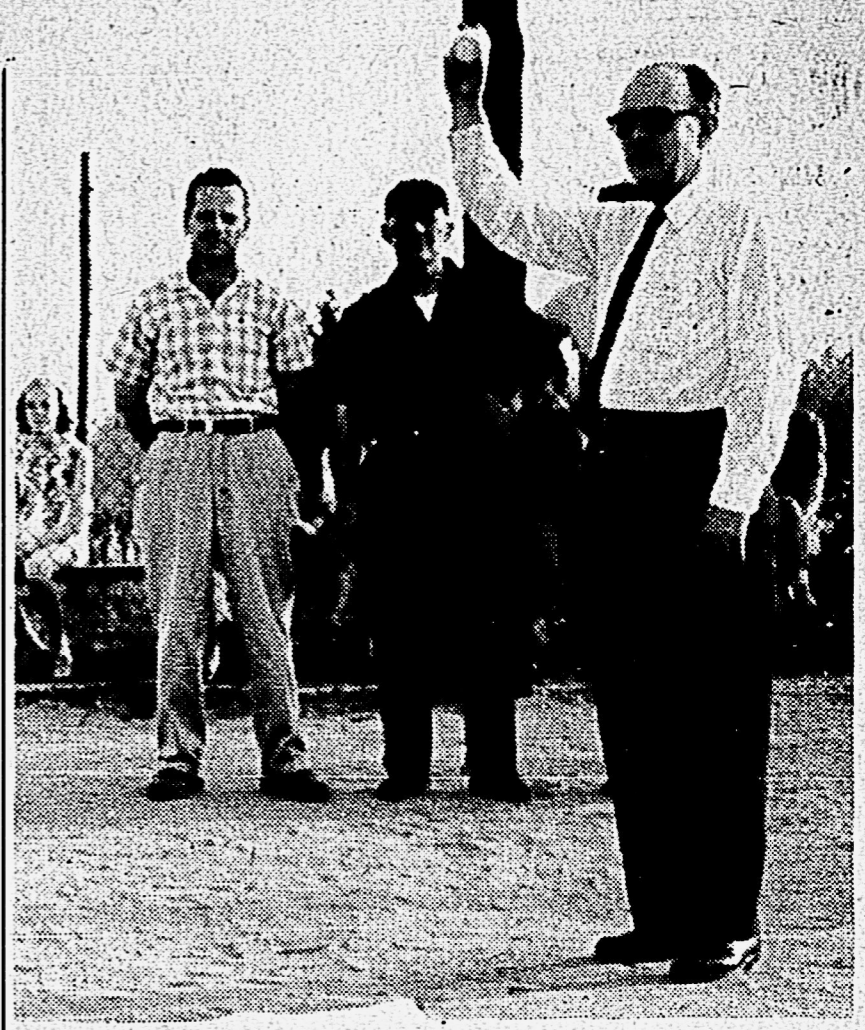

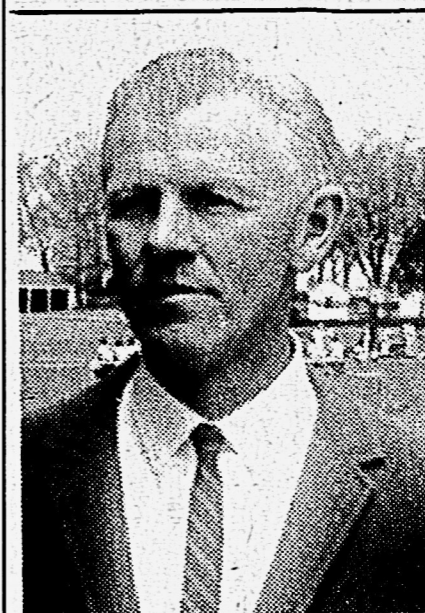
