In the second game against the Greyhounds at Evergreen, Washington bowed, 3-0, as Dick Carrington was charged with the loss after giving up five hits. The Shoremen had a pair of safeties, by Bob Manning and Dick Natwick.

In the first game Al Eisel, Natwick, John Sloan and Al Perry each had a pair of safeties. Bates fanned 10 and gave up three walks.

Against Mt. St. Mary's, Washington trailed 3-0 at the end of the sixth but exploded for six runs in the seventh. Two errors and five walks, combined with Al Perry's double and Al Eisel's single, accounted for the Shoremen's runs. Bates fanned 13 and walked six.

Strausburg won both hurdle events and Reddish took the 100-yard and 220-yard dashes. Smith knocked off the 880-yard run and Washington took the mile relay with Ben Troutman running the anchor leg in place of Strausburg, who was taken ill.
