Upon the organization of the Convention, the editor of the OBSERVER was placed on the committee on resolutions, which retired shortly after 1 o'clock and remained in session until 3 o'clock. Information reached the Convention Hall between two and three o'clock that ex-Governor Jackson desired the nomination of Judge Crothers. This information was in the shape of a letter addressed to the Baltimore city delegation, which read as follows: "If you have any regard for my judgment, and if what Rusk says is true vote for Judge Crothers. If you nominate Williams, he will be beaten worse than Hearst in 1895. Name Crothers I beg of you." Signed, E. E. Jackson.

The result of the work of the Convention in the end gave satisfaction and harmony in all sections of the State, and the general opinion is that the entire ticket as nominated by that Convention will be victorious in November next with flattering majorities.

DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION

The Democratic State Convention, which met in Baltimore Thursday of last week, nominated one of the strongest tickets that has ever been paced before the people of this State, and the platform upon which they stand is without parallel. The Queen Anne's county delegation, when it reached Baltimore Wednesday, the day before the Convention, found that Judge Crothers was being urged to make a fight for the Governorship. He was conceded by all elements in the State to be the strongest man that could be nominated, but the Western Shore delegates and those from Baltimore city took the stand that Judge Crothers must show a solid Eastern Shore front before they would give him enough votes to make his nomination possible. In the meantime, the Baltimore City delegation was solidly for Mr. Harry Williams, of Baltimore City, and it was apparent that they held the key to the situation.

DEMOCRATIC NOMINEES ANSWER

Week before last we propounded the same questions to the Democratic Legislative nominees as was propounded to the Independent nominees in our issue of June 28th, just after their nomination. So far the Independent nominees have failed to answer the questions, thereby ignoring the right of the Democratic voters of this county, whose suffrage they are seeking to ascertain just how they stand politically.


CAPITALISTS OPPORTUNITY.
