### KENTUCKY REPUBLICAN

Heavy Gains Indicate Election of A. S. Wilson, For Governor.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 6.—A complete reversal of the usual Democratic majorities in the city of Louisville and heavy Republican gains throughout the state in a ratio that indicated the probable election of Wilson, the Republican candidate for governor, in the situation after one of the most hotly contested elections in Kentucky. Only 24 of the 119 counties in Kentucky, exclusive of Louisville and Jefferson county, have been heard from. These counties gave Samuel W. Hager, Democratic candidate for governor, a plurality of 224 over Augustus E. Willson, Republican. The same counties in 1903 gave Beckham, Democrat, for governor a plurality of 4378, a Republican gain of 2754. The same ratio in the remaining counties insures Willson's election.

In Louisville and Jefferson county, which were not included in the foregoing figures, 117 precincts give Willson 2835 plurality and James F. Grinstead, Republican candidate for mayor, 1246 plurality over Owen Tyler, Democrat. The city and county are conceded to the Republicans by majorities estimated at 2300 for Grinstead and 4200 for Willson. The Republicans have also gained many seats in the legislature. The indications, however, are that the Democrats will have a majority on joint ballot and that Governor Beckham will be elected United States senator. In the last legislature the Democrats had a majority of 32 on joint ballot. It is expected that this will be reduced to about 20.

### FATAL ELECTION RIOT

One Man Killed and Three Wounded, One Fatally, at Lexington, K.

Lexington, Ky., Nov. 6.—Following an election day riot here, Clyde Campbell was killed, Patrolman Michael Murphy probably fatally wounded, and Patrolman Marion Smith and W. R. Campbell, Clyde's father, severely wounded. The elder Campbell, who was a Republican candidate for councilman, was arrested after he had protested against what he termed election frauds. His son came to his assistance and was shot by Murphy. W. R. Campbell then shot Murphy, who returned the fire, severely wounding his man, although himself fatally hurt.

There is some difference in reports as to the details of the shooting. A graphic account is given by Thomas A. Knight, who saw the tragedy. Knight said that in a large crowd at a voting place he saw Police Officer Murphy struggling with W. R. Campbell. When the struggle seemed nearly over and the policeman's antagonist seemed to be ceasing his resistance, he saw young Campbell run up and strike Murphy in the face. Murphy turned and kicked Campbell in the stomach. Campbell then ran on East High street, while Murphy continued toward the police station with his prisoner.

A little later young Campbell came running up with a revolver in his hand. He ran up to Murphy and showed the pistol into his face. Murphy was evidently surprised at the attack but he held on to his prisoner. Campbell demanded of Murphy that he turn his father loose, but Murphy refused. Just then Patrolman Smith came, and, as young Campbell turned to see the officer, Murphy struck him three times over the head with his club. Young Campbell dropped to his knees, and as he did so the elder Campbell shot Murphy in the back. Smith then drew his revolver and the shooting became general. Smith shot old man Campbell. Murphy staggered up against the side of the building and continued to fire, shooting several times. He was still using his pistol when he was struck by another bullet, apparently fired by young Campbell. Murphy had fallen, but he got up and staggered to where young Campbell was struggling with some one who had caught him. Murphy leaves, over and placed the muzzle of his pistol within a few inches of young Campbell's body, took deliberate aim and fired.

### The President Voted.

Washington, Nov. 6.—President Roosevelt cast ballot at Oyster Bay, New York, thus registering his choice as to two associate justices of the court of appeals, a justice of the supreme court of the state, member of the assembly, county officers and several proposed amendments to the state constitution. For the president to exercise the elective franchise necessitated 18 hours and 225 miles of railroad travel and four minutes in the voting booth.

**Toledo Sticks to "Golden Rule."**  
Toledo, O., Nov. 6.—Brand Whitlock was re-elected mayor of Toledo by a plurality estimated between 5000 and 6000. The campaign had been locally spectacular, but also carries with it a paradoxical urban quality. The fight was made upon the issue of franchise for street railway corporations, along the lines as laid down by Tom Johnson, mayor of Cleveland. Opponents of Whitlock put up an argument of law and morality enforcement.

**Mississippi Elects a Governor.**  
Jackson, Miss., Nov. 6.—The Democratic state ticket, headed by E. F. Noel for governor, was elected. Only a small vote was cast. The other officers include Luther Manship, lieutenant governor; E. J. Smith, auditor; G. R. Edwards, treasurer; J. W. Power, secretary of state; T. M. Henry, insurance commissioner; R. V. Fletcher, attorney general; and H. E. Buchanan, commissioner of agriculture.

### TAMMANY WINS IN NEW YORK

Fusion Ticket Defeated By Large Majorities.

New York, Nov. 6.—What little there was in the apathetic election over the result of the Republican Independence League fusion in New York county, the showing in the Independence League in the county alone against the identical ticket of the Republicans and Democrats to negotiate justices of the court of appeals and the make-up of the next state assembly.

Fusion failed in New York county, the straight Democratic ticket being elected with majorities of from 20,000 to 25,000.

Thomas F. Foley, Democratic candidate for sheriff, defeated Maximilian F. Ihmsen, an Independence League representative on the fusion ticket.

Chairman Parsons, of the Republican county committee, who was credited with having arranged the fusion, expressed surprise at the result and placed the responsibility on the financial situation and repeaters. Leaders of the Independence wing of the fusion unreservedly declared its defeat due to fraud.

In Kings county (Brooklyn) the Republicans were generally successful, though the Democrats re-elected District Attorney Clarke.

The Republicans lost a few members of the assembly, probably six. Republicans swept all their candidates with one exception into office at Buffalo. Elvira returned to the Democratic column so far as the majority was concerned.

For the first time in 14 years the Republicans elected a mayor in Utica, and for the first time in 17 years the Democrats carried Newburgh. The Republicans were victorious in Ulster county and elected their candidate for mayor in Kingston. In Rochester the Republicans elected a mayor, but the Democrats carried the common council. Despite the protests of the united clergy, the Democrats of Auburn elected a brewer for mayor. In Troy Mayor Elias P. Mann was re-elected by the Republicans with a plurality of 250. The Independence League vote up state was light.

### BOURKE COCKRAN ARRESTED

Democratic Congressman Charged With Voting Illegally.

New York, Nov. 6.—Congressman W. Bourke Cockran was arrested on a charge of illegal voting at a polling place in Third avenue. The policeman who made the arrest said he could not verify the address given by Mr. Cockran at 310 East 17th street, from which address Mr. Cockran had registered. The congressman was taken to the police station and thence to a police court.

Mr. Cockran is a grand sachem of Tammany Hall. A servant at the East 17th street house, had sworn that the name Bourke Cockran does not there, and Magistrate Cornell issued the warrant while under the impression that some was trying to vote on the congressman's name. When Mr. Cockran was arraigned in court one of State Attorney General Jackson's assistants denounced the arrest as an outrage, and Mr. Cockran was promptly discharged. Mr. Cockran said the East 17th street house was his residence before he went to congress, and that he had never forfeited his right to vote from that address. "When I registered," he said, "I told the inspectors who I was and explained the entire situation. I was not challenged when I registered. I fall to see on what authority this arrest was made."

### TOM JOHNSON RE-ELECTED

Chosen Mayor of Cleveland Over Theodore E. Burton.

Cleveland, Nov. 6.—Mayor Tom L. Johnson was re-elected for the fourth time as mayor of Cleveland in a hard fought battle, in which the Republican ticket was headed by Congressman Theodore E. Burton, chairman of the house committee on rivers and harbors.

Chairman Baker, of the Republican committee, concedes the election of Johnson by 5000 plurality. At the Johnson headquarters his majority is placed at a higher figure. The entire Democratic city ticket was elected by 5000. The Democrats elect a majority of the councilmen.

Congressman Burton made considerable gains over the vote of two years ago, when William H. Boyd was the Republican candidate, but the gain was not sufficient to overcome the strong Johnson lead.

### Salt Lake City Votes Anti-Mormon.

Salt Lake City, Nov. 6.—Municipal candidates of the American (anti-Mormon) party have the largest plurality ever given in this city. Bradford, for mayor, will have from 7000 to 10,000 plurality over Plummer, Republican, and Morris, Democrat, whose strength is evenly divided. The Americans will control the council. They have been in power for the last two years.

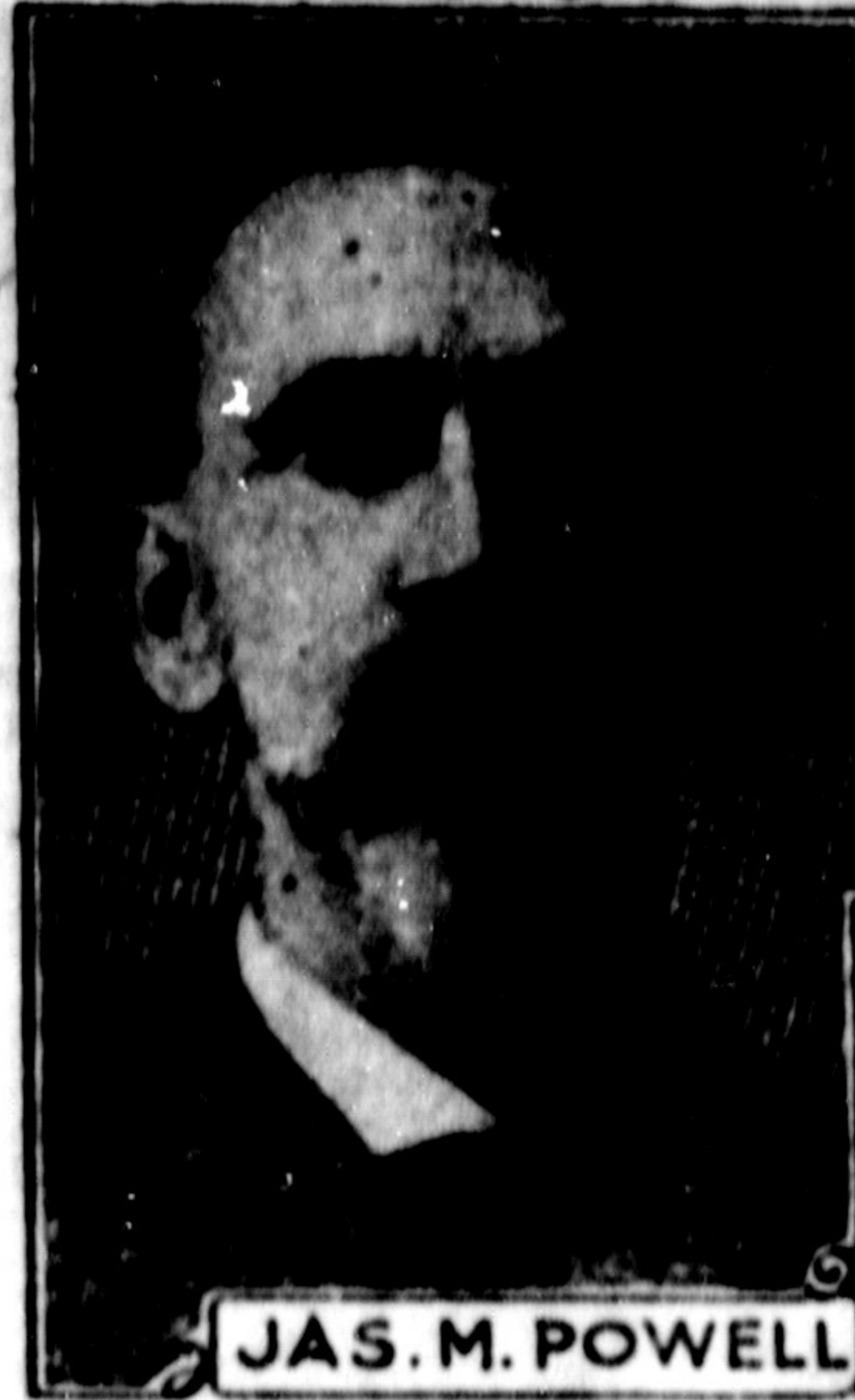
### Nebraska Elects Republican Judge.

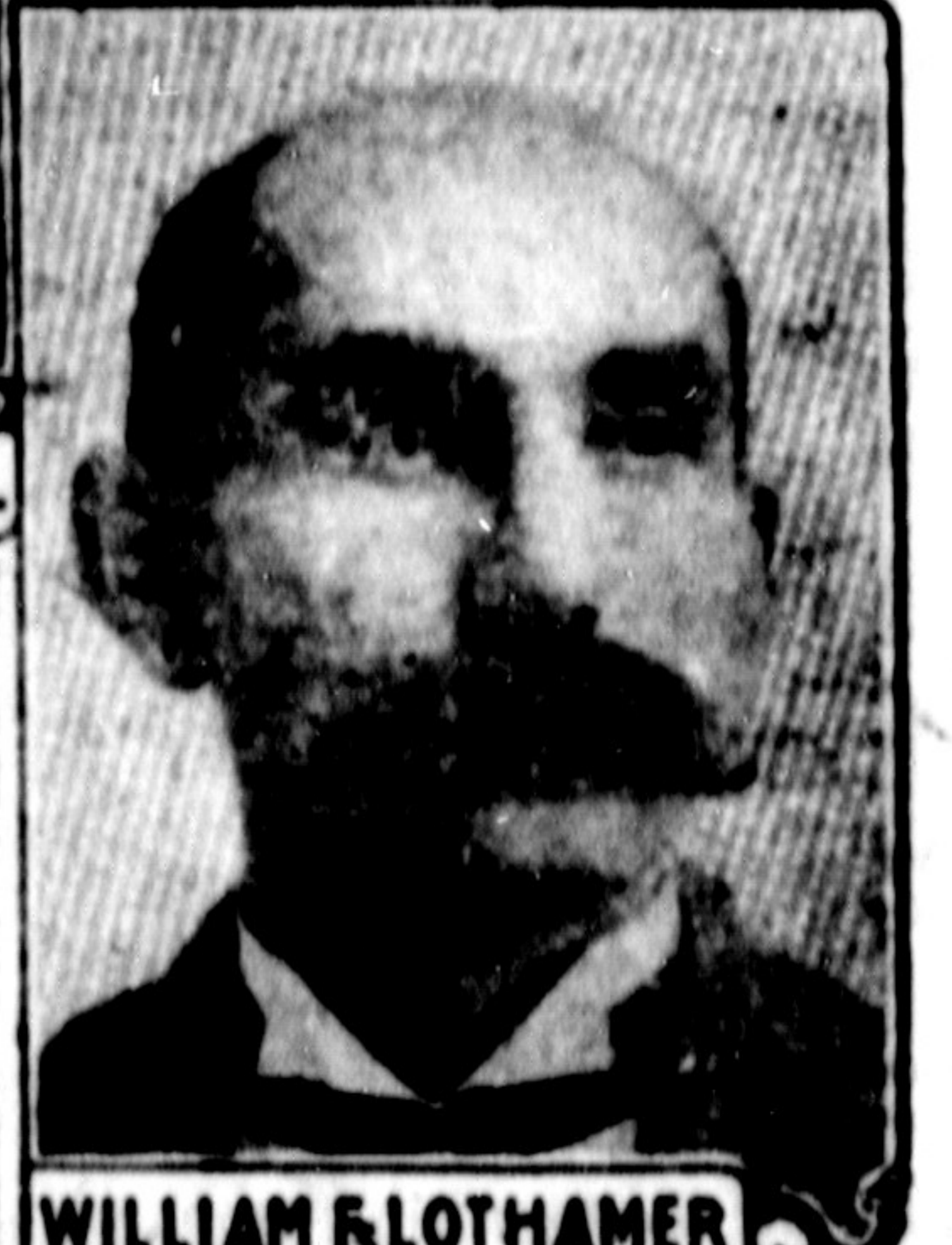
