The remains of Thomas C. Stayton a highly respected citizen of Queen Anne, who died Friday of last week were interred in Hillsboro Cemetery lest Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock Services were held at his late home in Queen Anne. Mr. Stayton died after a long illness.

The deceased was a native of Staytonville, a village near Milford, Del. He was born in 1848. Rev. Charles Stayton, of Portland, Oregon, a Methodist minister of note; John W. Mr. Seth's report will be forthcom ing next week and will be submitted by him to the State Roads Commissison It will be exceptionally complete and will cover all the important points which could be raised relative to the project. Available terminal facilities. the probable volume of traffic of every separate kind, the probable revenue and the consequent rates which would have to be charged, the type of boat best suited for the purpose, boats which are available and their cost and the kind of schedule which would best suit the public. Above all however, the report's recommenation will all be referred strictly to the par ticular problem under consideration and to the \$50,000 available.
