NOW OR LATER If surveying will bring an electric railway to Ellicott City it will be done. Now for three weeks engineers have been seeking the most practicable route to get into and out of our locality. That it will be a difficult and expensive feat there is no doubt. To cross the river and get down into the depression of the lower part of our city and then get out of it into the uplands of the county, at the least cost, has caused and is causing the much surveying. But what will be the outcome of it all? We are informed that the projectors of the line want the citizens to subscribe liberally or the line will not be built. Those who have property along the proposed line should not hesitate to subscribe as liberally as their resources will allow. The project is bound to bring more money to the county and enhance the price of real estate and give new life to the sec-

tions through which it will pass. The electric railway has come to stay. Radiating from every important city in the Union can now be seen the trolley system, often extending miles into hitherto out-of-the-way places and always connecting two important places within a reasonable distance of each

Those who own stock in the B. & O. Railroad should not be disturbed by the fear that it will lessen its business in this section. A line from the central parts of the county to Ellicott City will serve too low for best growth of vegetation.
