REPEALED.

Mr. Voorhees's substitute for the Wil son bill repeating the silver purchase cause of the Sherman act was passed in the Senate Monday evening by a vote of 4 to 32. Twenty-three Republicans and 20 Democrats voted for the bill, and 19 Democrats, 10 Republicans, and 3 Populists voted against it.

The House at 2.30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon by a vote of 191 yeas to 94 feel, that we are acting for the best innays concurred in the Wilson repeal bill as it came from the Senate with the Voorhees amendment.

Thus ends one of the most notable debates of our day as far as the Senate is concerned. Here a coterie of men especially those from the silver states in their defiance of public sentiment showed symptoms of incipient revolution. Their demand for the continuance of a law which was producing financial wrecks all over the country and creating widespread disturbance began to be regarded by the country as an outrageous disregard of reason and past experience, savoring strongly of miningcamp recklessness. On the part of the anti-repealers it was a demand that the government recognize a special interest-pig silver, a metal that of late years having been mined in such quantities had become a commodity on the market of little more importance than copper, aluminum or tin. It has so far descended from being a precious metal that the dollar cannot be kept as a dollar unless artificially substained by gold. The government has been doing this at an immense loss and to further weight or handicap pthe government by obliging it'to make almost unlimited purchases of silver would alone have justified the repeal of the Sherman law. This, as has been demonstrated over and over again, was the least of the evils' atllicting the country from the presence of silver under its late phase. Foreign investors fearing that the silver agitation would cause the country to finally drift into adopting a silver basis, were fast withdrawing their investments from the country and robbing us of the neces-

comme icial nation like our own. The question sharply drew the line among congressmen as to who was sound on a great financial question and who was not. Singular enough men who have hitherto been regarded as sound on every other question became callous to what was evidently a popular appeal and were ready to ignore what every solid interest in the country was ready to demonstrate as a glaring fact-that the purchasing clause of the Sherman silver law was the cause of a distrust which at any moment threatened to envelope the country with a financial gloom such as this or any other country never experienced.







DROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR.

STATE OF MARYLAND, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

WHEREAS, Section one of Article fourteen of the Constitution of Maryland makes it th duty of the Governor to order the publication in certain newspapers to be designated by him, of any bill, or bills, passed proposing any amendments to the said Constitution; and WHEREAS, at the January Session, 1892, of the General Assembly of Maryland, a biil was passed proposing an amendment to the Constitution, which amendment is Chapter 313 of the Acts of 1892, and is as follows, to wit:

CHAPTER 313. AN ACT to add an additional section to Article four of the Constitution of this

State. SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, Three-fifths of all th nembers of the two houses concurring, thu the following section be, and the same is here by proposed, as an amendment to the Constiution of this State; and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof, as herein provided the same shall supercede and stand in the place of Section thirty-nine of Article our of said Constitution.

Sec. 39. The General Assembly shall, a often us it may think the same proper and expedient, provide by law for the election of in additional Judge of the Supreme Bench of Baltimore city, and whenever provision is so made by the General Assembly, there shall be elected by the voters of said city anothe Judge of the Supreme Bench of Battimor city, who shall be subject to the same consti utional provisions, hold his office for the ameterm of years, receive the same compen sation, and have the same powers as are, or shall be provided by the Constitution, or law of this State, for the Judges of said Suprem Bench of Baltimore city, and the General Assembly may provide by laws, or the Supreme Bench by its rules, for requiring causes in any of the courts of Baltimore city to be tried before the Court without a jury unless the litigants or some one of them shal within such reasonable time or times, as may e prescribed, elect to have their causes trie before a jury. And the General Assembly may reapportion, change or enlarge the jurisdiction of the several courts in said city. Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid, That the foregoing section hereby proposed as an amendment the Constitution shall be, at the next general election to be held in this State, submitted the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection in pursuance of the

Constitution of this State; and at the said general election the vote on said propose amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall be written or printed the words "For the Constitutional Amendment" or "Against the Constitutional Amendment." as the voter may elect, and immediately after said election du return shall be made to the Governor of the votes for and against said proposed amend ment, as directed by said fourteenth Article
