What Prominent Bankers Say.

Discussing the probable effect of the repeal of the Sherman Silver law, Mr. J. Edward Simmons, president of the Fourth National Bank of New York said:

"There is no question but the first and immediate result of it will be a restoration of confidence, both at home and abroad, in the financial system of this country. It will make people feel better in financial and commercial circles. It is the first step toward the re-establishment of business prosperity. The cancellation of Clearing-house certificates and the relief of the banks from the indebtedness created thereby is the second step, and a wise and judicious disposition of the tariff question is the only obstacle that remains to be overcome before business will drift back into its customary channels and normal conditions be restored.

I think that Mr. Cleveland cannot be too highly commended by the business world for his firm and unflinching devotion to sound money principles. He has proved himself to be not only a bold leader, but a fearless adherent to those economic laws upon which the financial, commercial and industrial success of all nations depends."

A. B. Hepburn, president of the Third National Bank, said: "The repeal must have a beneficial effect on business. The depressing influence it might have on the value of silver has been largely discounted in my judgment. Production has been diminished and silver miners have been getting themselves into a position to handle the product solely with reference to its commercial value. Should India impose an import duty on silver it might cause still further depression."

Henry Clews says: "With the final passage of the silver bill by the Senate Washington hereafter will be beset, tracked, and the merits of securities will be the influence that will regulate values. The silver measure has been removed without fear of resurrection. The United States is now on a world's money basis. Funds can come here from all parts of the world with safety of being returned in kind when needed. The repeal of the silver law changes our stock market from a local to a world's market."
