## ARGON.

Some of the Possible Uses of the New Atmospheric Gas. Though unique in its chemical inactivity, it would be premature to conclude that argon may not form compounds under conditions yet untried and that it is an absolutely "inert" and useless thing. Professor Roberts-Austen suggests that it may possibly play a part in certain metallurgical operations in which air is largely employed. In making Bessemer steel, for instance, not less than 100,000 cubic feet of air are blown through a ton of molten metal for the purpose of removing the carbon, silicon, phosphorus and other impurities. In this air there must be over 1,000 cubic feet of argon. Now, Professor Roberts-Austen has found by experiment that the argon which can be pumped out of Bessemer blow metal, and which is an inert gas, and the question arises whether the argon may not have united with the iron, as nitrogen undoubtedly does, and that the argon which is left in the puddle, and which is of the peculiarities which distinguish it from other steel. It is of course possible and perhaps more likely that the argon passes through the metal, and combines with it, but the suggestion is an interesting one and well worth experimental examination.

It may be argued that argon is in some way taken up by plants and contributes in an important manner to their nourishment and growth, although the attempts at such an experiment, and the animal substances have thus far yielded negative results. As is well known, plants are unable to take nitrogen directly from the air, but do so through certain gaseous compounds which are absorbed in solution by their roots. The air is, however, the original source of these compounds, and of all other naturally occurring gaseous substances, most of which are produced by the life activity of microorganisms, and from the natural substances which are decomposed by the action of bacteria. Argon, therefore, is prepared. — Popular Science Monthly.

### A GLIMPSE OF PALESTINE.

The Historic Pools of Solomon and the Pool of Bethesda. The pools of Solomon lie on the left of the road to Hebron, and at a distance from Jerusalem of about two hours. Distances in the east are measured by time, not by miles, as with us. In this question, however, depends considerably on the condition of the road. When last I journeyed along it, the mud was so deep and the heat so oppressive that it was almost impossible to proceed. At one place the horses came to a standstill. They were unable to drag the carriage, and we had to alight in order to help the animals to make headway. We were sorry for the poor brutes, they were so cruelly used by the driver. One of them died from the fierce blows he inflicted.

The tomb is at no great distance from this latter place. For many centuries the spot was marked by a pyramid of stones, and in the fifteenth century that is the existing structure was erected. We leave it and pass onward along the slope of the valley. We notice on our right the town of Hebron, and on our left the mountain side. It appears to correspond with the ancient Gibeon, noted as the birthplace of Abimelech, the counselor of Absalom. Its inhabitants are Christians. — Quiver.

### The World's Papers.

A statistician has learned that the annual aggregate circulation of the papers of the world is calculated to be 12,000,000,000 copies. To grasp any idea of this magnitude we may state that it would cover no fewer than 10,450 square miles of surface; that it is printed on 781,250 tons of paper, and, further, that if the number 12,000,000,000 represented, instead of copies, seconds, it would take over 333 years for them to elapse. In lieu of this arrangement might press and pile them vertically upward to gradually reach our highest mountains. Topping all these and even the height of the Alps would reach the magnificent altitude of 490, or, in round numbers, 500 miles. Calculating that the average man spends five minutes reading this paper in the day (this is a very low estimate), we find that the people of the world altogether annually occupy thus equivalent to 100,000 years reading the papers.

### Figures in the Queen's Fortunes.

Those who can spy a divinity in odd numbers and know how number nine figures in Etruscan religion, or clings to omens, planets, orders of angels, worthies, and so forth, besides the peculiar properties of its own inexplicable to all but mathematical—all such may be interested in finding how closely interwoven is this number with the life of Queen Victoria. The Duke of Kent, her father, was one of nine sons; her majesty is the ninth sovereign since the revolution of 1688. Born in the year 1819, she has lived 1819 (1 plus 8 plus 1 plus 9 equals 10), she came to the throne in 1837 (1 plus 3 plus 7 equals 10), in her nineteenth year. Her husband was born in 1819, she has had nine children; her eldest son, born on the 9th of November, married the daughter of Christian IX of Denmark, who was crowned in his nineteenth year. — Westminster Gazette.

### She Snubbed Napoleon.

Mme. de Chevreuse, a representative of one of the noblest families in France, declined the honor which Napoleon wished to confer on her, that of being maid of honor to his sister-in-law, the queen of Spain. She afterwards became Josephine's dame du palais, but always affected to look down on the imperial court. One day she went to a reception at the Tuilleries, being with diamonds. "What splendid jewels," remarked Napoleon. "Are they all real?" "Mon Dieu, sire, I really don't know, but at my age they are quite good enough to wear here!"

### Nature's Poisoning.

A case of poisoning by snuff is reported to the London Lancet by a Scotch doctor. A woman for some reason had swallowed two snuffboxes ground into a fine dust. She was seized with vertigo, became delirious, while the heart's action became faint. It took three days of energetic treatment to set her on her feet again.

In Guilford, Conn., stands a stone house built nearly ten years before the founding of King Charles I, which looks today as if it would last for another century or two. It was built in 1639, as much for a defense against the Indians as a paragon, and it was used for both purposes.
