CAPTURING SEALS.

The Wonderful Vitality and Courage of the Old Dog Hood.

The first blow, struck on his head, might as well have hit a stone wall, while, catching the second gaff end cleverly in his teeth, he shook the long handle to such good purpose that he cleared the pan of his enemies in an instant. Though he could at any moment have slipped off into the water, he would not do so, and soon a lucky blow under the jaw stretched him out. A perfect shower of blows on the head seemed to finish him off, and a heavy strap being placed around him, he was hauled to the bulwarks by the steam winch.
Just as he got there his immense weight broke it down, and he disappeared, we thought for good, but in a minute or so he suddenly appeared again, and, refreshed by the cold water, he climbed out on to the very same pan, where the hunters were ungalant enough to return and dispatch him with their long spears. Next he came by and means have it all his own way. So agile and powerful are these beasts that they will jump clear out of the water on to a pan 10 to 15 feet high without any effort, and in no other way they could climb on it, and many a man has been badly mauled and bitten and dragged into the water in endeavoring to capture the valiant old fellows.—Hittsburg Dispatch.

Relics of the Spanish Armada.
One of the most fatal spots for armada ships had been Sligo bay. LONG FINGER NAILS.

Indicate Rank and Good Breeding In Many Oriental Countries.
The countries where the long finger nail is a mark of distinction are, among others, China and Siam. In China, the nail varies from three or four to 23 inches. A Siamese exquisite permits the nails on his fingers to grow to such an extent that his hands are practically useless. The Siamese hold the long finger nail in the same reverence as the Chinese. The nails are cut from the day of their birth. On the first finger the nail is of moderate length—three or four inches—while on the other fingers the nails grow occasionally two feet. The thumb nail, which is allowed to grow long, after reaching a certain length curves around like a corkscrew. In both China and Siam the owners of long nails wear metal cases over them to preserve them, made of gold or silver, and jeweled. While long nails are not regarded as singular in China, they are rarely met with except on fanatics and pedantic scholars.
Among the fakirs in Hindustan a peculiar custom is that of holding the hand tightly clenched and in this position so long that the nails and flesh grow together, the palm, emerging at the back of the hand and growing thence almost to the wrist. When the wasted muscles refuse to support the hand, the fakir is bound in position with long nails.
In Nubia the long nail is regarded as indicative of good breeding. The aristocrats constantly display their finger tips to each other to insure a good growth. The inhabitants of the Marquesas Islands are among the most expert tattooers on earth, and not even the crown of the head, the breast and the lower arm, but the nails, too. The hands are ornamented with utmost care, all the fingers having their own pattern, so the hand would look as though increased in a tight fist, the nails being so long that they would be of enormous length which complete the hand adornment of the wealthier natives.—Chicago News.
