DOES DEATH END ALL? Elsewhere in this issue, Mr. F. B. Livesey, yielding to a request, has furnished us with "The Freethinkers' Creed." It is important that the readers of THE TIMES should know about this creed, what the freethinkers are thinking about as distinguished from the general line of religious belief held by the orthodox world. The creed impresses us with the belief that those who accept its tenets are honest agnostics-actually seeking light, as did the ancient Athenians when they dedicated a monument to the "Unknown God." They reasoned that existing somewhere there must be a First Great Cause, over and above all the other gods they worshipped. Apparently this was the conclusion they had reached. They vainly endeavored to pierce the gloom of the moral darkness by which they were surrounded. The episode of Paul, the apostle, appearing at Athens seemed to illume the minds of many and many accepted Paul's explanation of their situation as being rational and the only possible solution of the difficulty.

"They (all sacred books, including the Christian's bible) are all human, fallible, and their teachings are to be accepted with reason and truth," says the Freethinkers' Creed. Just how the freethinkers can class the scriptures of the old and new testament with the sacred books of the heathen or idolatrous peoples is hard to see. The Christian's bible has given us a grand civilization, lofty aspirations, correct ideas of human progress, wonderful scientific light; created schools, henevolence, charity, lovely homes basking in the light, with a tendency to subdue the fierce passions of men, &c. Reason should teach us that these scriptures are incomparable. What would have been the condition of the world at this time had there been no Christ or New Testament? is a question we would like our free thinking friends to answer. 
