COMMUNICATION.

Two directors can in any of the banks prevent discounts from being given to persons against whom their minds may be either justly or unjustly prejudiced. This great power is necessary to the safety of the bank.—But it has some evil tendencies, which experience has taught us must be counteracted by the rotation principle. This principle is all important in the election of bank directors.—Its existence deters any two of them from combining to oppress a worthy merchant or mechanic, by refusing discounts, to which he is justly entitled by the goodness of the paper offered; and his right to an equal participation in the benefit of discounts, intended by the legislature to be impartially granted to every class of citizens. Mr Robert Stewart confesses that he was induced to vote against this principle, against this safe guard, by the solicitation of every director of the Mechanics Bank. As a republican, how inconsistent (to use no harsher term) is the conduct of Mr Stewart in countenancing this peltion by his name, and supporting it by his vote in the House of Delegates? My fellow citizens, if this peltion had been granted, the effective power of independent suffrage would have been trampled by the fears of the less wealthy of the stockholders; their votes might have been biased by pecuniary considerations, and the office of director has been perpetual—it would have become an absolute sinecure—yet Mr Stewart does not think this vote a test. If he had believed that it would have prevented his re-election he might perhaps have thought so; and I hope, that by your decision you will prevent his ever giving a similar vote. There are more bank charters to be granted by the next assembly, and he is not the man should have a voice in their formation.

- September 29, ENTERED, Sch'r Lively, Burgess, Esq. port CLEARED, Sch'r Speedwell, Gor. on Porto Rico Merchant, Brown, Havana Boston, Rhodes, Jackmel Arrived, ship Diana, Holbrook 45 days from Liverpool—dry goods to Wm Wilson & Sons Left there 15th ult. ships Leda, and Christopher Gore, for La Guayra, to sail 25th; the Aldebron, and Sally of Boston, for Bal., sailed in co. In lat. 44, lon 47, fell in with several islands of ice; narrowly escaped Also, schr Dash, Austin, 27 days fr. La Guayra—coffee and hides—Abraham White. Left the 2d inst among others, schr Fame, Davis, of Baltimore, discharging; Sally, Betts, do do Captain N. informs, that in consequence of Santa Fe declaring itself independent, an uncommon expression of rejoicing took place at La Guayra, Caracas, and through all the country.—An English vessel arrived at La Guayra, which informed that the ports on the Main are declared in a state of blockade by the Spaniards; that a number of privateers were fitting out at Porto Rico and city of St. Domingo, to cruise against all vessels bound to or from those ports that declared for independence.—In consequence of this information, the Dash to avoid danger, instead of coming through the Moss, came round Cape Tiboron; which off the Mole, was becalmed the whole day; at day light heard an excessive firing which continued till half past 11, apparently a land engagement. Shortly after the firing commenced, saw 7 sail of vessels standing in, about 11 o'clock 3 of them returned, and capt A. thinks the other four were captured or otherwise detained; he observed, that upon the 3 coming out, one of the boats which they were obliged to pass, opened a powerful fire at them. The scho. Norfolk, Seaward, from Tonnig, for Baltimore, has arrived at Norfolk.

Port of Salem, Sept. 23.

ARRIVED, Brig Henry, Harris, from Gottenburg, with German goods. Capt. Harris left

in Gottenburg roves the ships Selveten, Haulah, for Philadelphia, and Concordia, Johnson, for New York, both from St. Petersburg, and afraid to proceed further on account of the recent captures by the Norwegians, they have been prevented by the British from passing thro' the Sound. The supercargoes were therefore gone to Copenhagen to make protest against their being forced through the Belts, and to offer to pay the Sound duties, and to obtain a pass as a security against the Norwegian privateers. The cargoes of these ships were estimated at from 150,000 to 200,000 dollars each.

Copp, master parted with her off Knock John. It was reported at Archangel that there were six Danish privateers in the White Sea—their intentions unknown. Brig Augusta, Haraden, from Archangel—Sailed 8 days previous to the D. yada

The Augusta was taken on her passage from Archangel by a Danish sloop of war, in lat 71 34, lon 24, and sent into Pumascut—After being examined by the commissioners was cleared by paying port fees. The Danes had taken about 20 sail of vessels bound to and from Archangel, among which were two American, a brig from Portsmouth, Va and a ship said to belong to Philada but no name on her stern. Spoke in lat 49 49, lon 42, brig Effizbeth, of Newburyport, 14 days from Boston, bound to Liverpool, all well.
