Beyond the ravine, still further to the left, is a dense thicket of pines, running a considerable distance along the high bank to the extremity of the Point. The Freeborn then opened a cannonade from both guns, throwing in shot and shell in various \ parts of the land to check the advance of an enemy while the boats landed. The landing was safely accomplished, the boats employed being those of the Pauree, Captain Ward going off in the first cutter. The table land was soon gained, when the retel pickets opened fire on our men, which the latter returned.
