THE SOUTHAMPTON MURDERS. We learn that at least \$15,000 in silver have been found on the premises of Mr. Scott, the Quaker who was murdered together with five of his household, by a miscreant who had invaded the home of a miserly old man under the impulses of a diabolically criminal cupidity.

REMOVAL OF SIR JOHN HARVEY. The London Globe announces that Major General Sir Thomas Pearson, now in command of the North of Ireland, is to proceed to New Brunswick, in the room of Major General Sir John Harvey, ordered to India.
