

BALTIMORE CLIPPER

A BILL, entitled, a supplement to an act, entitled an act to incorporate the Trustees of the Poor of Baltimore city and county.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall and may be lawful for the trustees of the poor of Baltimore city and county, whenever satisfactory information is given to them, that any child who may have been bound out by them as an apprentice, by virtue of the several acts of Assembly authorizing the same, has been cruelly or inhumanly treated by his or her master, or may have been abandoned or so entirely neglected by his or her master, as to render it certain that the said apprentice will not be taught the trade, art or mystery contemplated by the indenture of apprenticeship, to cause the said child to be returned to the city and county almshouse.

Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of the trustees for the poor of Baltimore city and county, upon the return of any apprentice in one or more of the newspapers of the city or county, in which the master of said apprentice may have last resided, of the return of said apprentice to the city and county almshouse, at least once a week for three weeks, and to warn all persons whom it may concern, that unless proper care shall be shown to the said trustees at or before the expiration of three weeks from the day of the first publication of said notice, that the said trustees will proceed as hereinafter provided, to cause the indentures of apprenticeship of such child to be cancelled and set aside.

Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That upon the exhibition to the justices of the orphan's court of Baltimore city and county, of a certificate under seal, from the trustees of the poor of Baltimore city and county, setting forth the return of any apprentice bound out by the said trustees to the city and county almshouse, and their belief that from the conduct of the master towards said apprentice, the interest of the said apprentice would be promoted by the vacation of the indenture of apprenticeship, together with a copy of the publication required by the second section of this act, it shall be the duty of the justices of the said court, and of any one of them, to set aside and cancel the said indenture of apprenticeship.

Sec. 4. And be it enacted, That the trustees for the poor of Baltimore city and county, shall have power and authority to bind out again any apprentice whose indentures may have been set aside as aforesaid, in as full, large and ample a manner, as if the said apprentice had not been previously bound out.

Sec. 5. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of the grand jury of Baltimore city, and the grand jury of Baltimore county, to visit and inspect the Baltimore city and county almshouse, at least once a year, and to report to their respective courts the condition, discipline and management of the said institution, or by bill to preserve any abuse, violation of law or neglect of duty in the same, which may come to their knowledge.

Sec. 6. And be it enacted, That the name of the officer having charge of the said institution, here designated as "The Overseer," be and the same is hereby changed to that of "Warden" of the almshouse of Baltimore city and county.

Sec. 7. And be it enacted, That James L. Ridgely, James Wilkes, Jr. of Washington Booth, Samuel G. Baker, of the city of Baltimore, on the part of the city, and Joshua Hutchins, William Crook, and Tobias E. Stansbury, of Baltimore county, on the part of the county, be and they are hereby appointed and constituted the board of trustees for the almshouse of Baltimore city and county.

Sec. 8. And be it enacted, That at the first meeting of the board after the passage of this act, the trustees on the part of the city shall divide themselves into four classes, by ballot or otherwise, as a majority of them may determine, the first class shall go out of office at the expiration of one year from the passage of this act; the second class at the expiration of two years, the third class at the expiration of three years, and the fourth class at the expiration of four years, from the passage of this act; and at the same meeting, and in such manner as a majority of them shall determine, the trustees on the part of the county shall divide themselves into three classes, the first class shall go out of office at the expiration of one year from the passage of this act, the second class at the expiration of two years, and the third class at the expiration of three years, from the passage of this act.

Sec. 9. And be it enacted, That the vacancies which shall occur under the provisions of the above section, shall be filled by appointment as now provided by law; and that all vacancies which shall occur by death, resignation, or removal out of the city or county, shall in like manner be filled by appointment as now provided by law.

CITY COUNCIL. First Branch, Jan. 25. Pursuant to adjournment the Council met. Present—Mr. Snyder, president, and all the members. Whether there were any "set speeches" anticipated or not we are unable to say, but the number of lobby members was unusually large. Perhaps it was thought that Mr. Bradshaw had intended making his "maiden speech," all were disappointed—his eloquence was mute as the chords of an unstrung harp.

The first business brought up was a petition offered by Mr. Myers signed Wells R. Hall and others, praying for a refund of taxes erroneously paid by him on property which he had disposed of some two years since. It was referred to the City Collector. A motion was made to refer the petition back again to the committee on claims, which was carried. Messrs. Myers, Pinkney and Fields entered into a slight discussion. Mr. P. was of opinion that the Council had no jurisdiction over the matter—the petitioner's redress must first be had by law, and that subsequently it might be brought up and be a prerogative of the Council. Mr. Myers was of the same opinion. Mr. Hack was of a contrary opinion. Mr. Cole presented the petition of John R. Wright and others, relative to the markets, which was referred to the joint committee on markets.

ESCAPE OF DR. HINES. We learn, says the N. O. Picayune of the 15th, that the notorious Dr. Hines, who was sent to the penitentiary at Baton Rouge last summer for fourteen years, has escaped and is again at large.—By some means he got possession of false keys, made his way by the aid of them to the cigar shop in the upper part of the prison, cut a hole in the roof and then let himself down by means of cords. An Irishman escaped at the same time but was afterwards retaken.

It seems that the runaways kept company, with the prison chains still fast to them, for some six miles back of Baton Rouge. On reaching the highlands the clank of the chains was heard by some negroes belonging to a plantation, who immediately gave the alarm. A pack of dogs were put upon the trail and after a short run succeeded in capturing the Irishman, but Hines made his escape. Hundreds of the citizens of Baton Rouge, however, were in pursuit, and our informant states that they were sanguine of again capturing him. We could not learn how Hines came in possession of keys and cords, but it would appear that he must have had friends outside who assisted him.

FREAK OF A WATCHMAN. On Friday night, a substitute watchman, in the Middle District, named William Keene, was arrested by Captain Mullen and Lieut. Hann, and brought to the watch house, charged with taking from a boy \$30, which the latter had picked up in the street, and, as it subsequently appeared, had been dropped by Mr. Samuel G. Wymann. On being arraigned before the officers, Keene admitted that he had taken the money from the boy, and offered to return ten dollars, that being all he had in possession, having spent the other \$20. In the morning he was taken before Justice Wright, who committed the offender to prison for further examination.—Patriot.
