TO CORRESPONDENTS. We yesterday declined publishing the communication of "Washington," which was upon the same subject as that commented on by "A Member," who has since favored us with his remarks.

Mr. BIDDLE'S LETTER. Justice demands that we should publish the letter of Mr. Biddle, explanatory of certain transactions with the Bank of the United States, which were the subject of comment in the report recently submitted by the committee of stockholders.

THE PROCESSION. Although, from peculiar causes, the citizens of Baltimore have been rather more tardy than those of other cities in a public manifestation of their feelings on the recent melancholy event, yet we have no doubt that the long procession will prove that those feelings are as intense and general, as in any city of the Union.

FAMILY OF THE LATE PRESIDENT. We have seen suggestions in various papers, that Congress should make a liberal appropriation to the family of the late President. We presume that no man would deem it just to confine the family to the receipt of the salary for the month which the President was in office.

CROSS-CUT CANAL. A Pittsburg paper says that great preparations are being made for an early and active business on Pittsburg, all along the canal to Cleveland and on Lake Erie to Detroit, and all the intermediate ports.

A FIRE occurred at Huron, which destroyed the office of Mr. Gray, of the Huron Commercial Advertiser. A portion of the printing materials saved. This is the second misfortune of the kind that has befallen his establishment at Huron.

ARREST. Augustus Brown, one of the persons who made his escape from jail last Sunday, was arrested yesterday at Harre de Grace, and brought back to this city and remanded to prison.

DR. J. B. MORRIS, Esq., has resigned the Presidency of the Branch Bank of Mobile and Edmund Harrison has been appointed in his stead.

CITY DEATHS. The number of interments in Philadelphia last week, was 119, of whom 37 were under two years of age.

PRESIDENTIAL RECOMMENDATION. It gives us great pleasure to publish the recommendation of President Tyler, that the fourteenth day of May next be observed as a day of Fasting and Prayer, for the affliction which the country has suffered from the death of General Harrison.

WASHINGTON, April 13, 1841. A SUGGESTION. In the Courier des Etats-Unis, we observe an article, on the McLeod affair, copied from an English journal called the Argus, which, after the grossest abuse of our government, courts of justice and the grand jury which found a true bill against McLeod, concludes by suggesting that, if McLeod be executed, the American Ministry, Mr. Stevenson should be hung in satisfaction by the people of London.

SINGULAR COINCIDENCE. It is remarkable that Mr. Tyler, who now becomes President of the United States, should for the third time step into a high public trust by the death of the incumbent. He was made Governor of Virginia by the death of the Governor, he being Senior Councillor—he was made a Senator by the death of one before his time expired—and now he becomes President by the death of the only man under whom he could ever have been elected a Vice President.

ROOKWOOD. We had the pleasure of witnessing the performance of this novel and beautiful equestrian drama on Monday night last, at the Front Street Theatre. Our mind, previous to going, was prepared for something good and thrilling; we can say that the piece fully met our most sanguine expectations. There were, to be sure, some few drags, which are always to be looked for upon the opening of so intricate and complicated a piece as Rookwood, but these were excused, when the mind became absorbed in the bold and daring adventures of Dick Turpin, with his "Bonny Black Bess."

THE FRESHET. The damage sustained by the north branch extension of the Canal from Athens to Lackawana, Pennsylvania, a distance of ninety miles, will amount, it is said, to \$20,000. The guard lock and bank of the Canal at Towanda, is also injured to the amount of \$8000.

MAINE BANKS. The Legislature of Maine have repealed the charters of the Citizens', Globe and Frankfort Banks, and the Governor and Council have appointed Receivers for said Banks.

RECOVERED. The body of Miss Elizabeth Knapp, who was drowned at the Hoboken Ferry on Friday, was recovered the same night.

THE FUNERAL OBSEQUIES IN N. YORK. We extract the following account of the funeral procession which took place in New York on Saturday last, in honor to the memory of our late lamented President, from the Courier and Enquirer:

"The mournful ceremony took place in accordance throughout, with the arrangements before made by the committee of this city and Brooklyn. The pageant was more extensive and imposing than any before witnessed in this city or country. 'The number of individuals who composed the procession is variously estimated at from 20 to 30,000. Probably a medium number would come near the truth. The parade of Military was very large, and presented a splendid appearance. But for the inclement state of the weather, the procession, large as it was, would have been more than double in extent. The streets through which the procession passed, were filled with a dense mass of spectators.

"The city throughout presented one scene of sorrow and solemnity. There was an utter cessation of business. Stores, dwellings, and public buildings were closed, and the fronts generally shrouded in black. Flags were flying at half mast and dressed in mourning likewise. The procession began to move about half past 1 o'clock up Chatham street from the Park. At about five o'clock, having passed over the prescribed line of march, the head of the column re-entered the Park by way of Broadway. In consequence of the cruel severity of the storm, the religious ceremonies and delivery of the oration, were deferred to another day. A requiem, written by Gen. Morris, was sung by the N. Y. Academy of Music and with this the crowd dispersed and returned to their homes. Not the slightest accident occurred throughout the day. All parties united on the occasion, and for the time all bitterness and acerbity of feeling was laid aside. The mourning was general, and the grief evinced in the features of all who witnessed or participated in the ceremonies was sincere, unfeigned. It was a universal expression of sorrow, as if every being present was a brother or sister of the same family, and all lamenting the loss of a common Father."

TRIBUTE OF RESPECT. At a full and joint meeting of the Session and Trustees of the 4th Presbyterian Church, Washington, held on Monday, the 12th of April, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted: Resolved, That while we, in common with the People of this country, mourn over the great and unexpected loss which our city and nation has sustained in the death of our late venerated President, General William Henry Harrison, we bow as Christians to the will of our Heavenly Father, saying, 'The Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away, blessed be the name of the Lord.'"

FIRE IN SAGO, MAINE. The Saco Democrat states that a barn attached to the house of Henry S. Thatcher, of Saco, was destroyed by fire on Sunday afternoon. Loss about \$1000. While the barn was burning, Capt. Christopher Howe, formerly of South Berwick, was standing by, and was observed to falter. Some gentlemen immediately assisted him. He revived a little, and then fell, a corpse! He was 69 years old.

AN INCIDENT. In the course of a sermon delivered on Sunday last, in Philadelphia, by the Rev. Mr. Brainard, he stated that about two years ago, a friend of his, who was preaching in the broad valley of the West, requested those present who desired to receive the prayers of the congregation, to stand up. General William Henry Harrison, our late Chief Magistrate, was the first to respond to the call, and from that time commenced his religious Career.
