CITY LICENSES.
CITY REGISTER'S OFFICE.
Baltimore, April 16, 1851.
THE following Ordinance is published for the information of all persons interested.
Section 1. Be it enacted and ordained, That from and after the passage of this ordinance, all Licenses now directed by ordinance to be granted annually, shall be next to terminate and expire on the first day of May next ensuing the date of this Ordinance.
Sec. 2. Be it enacted and ordained, That if any person or persons shall neglect to renew such License within twenty days after its expiration, he, she or they shall incur the penalty already provided for in the Ordinance to which this is a supplement.
Sec. 3. And be it enacted and ordained, That it shall be the duty of the Register to notify all persons annually of the necessity of attending to the provisions of this Ordinance, by advertising the same for ten days previous to the first day of May, in all the daily papers of the city.
Sec. 4. And be it enacted and ordained, That all Ordinances, or parts of Ordinances, which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, be, and the same are hereby repealed. S. C. LEAKIN, Mayor.
