Notice is hereby given that subscriptions will be received by the Treasurer of the United States, the several Assistant Treasurers, and designated Depositories, and by the National Banks designated and qualified as Depositories and Financial Agents, for Treasury Notes payable three years from August 15, 1864, bearing interest at the rate of seven and three-tenths per cent. per annum, with semi-annual coupons attached, payable in lawful money.

These notes will be convertible at the option of the holder at maturity, into six per cent. gold bearing bonds, redeemable after five and payable twenty years from August 15, 1867. The Notes will be issued in denominations of fifty, one hundred, five hundred, one thousand, and five thousand dollars, and will be issued in blank, or payable to order, as may be directed by the subscribers.

All subscriptions must be for fifty dollars, or some multiple of fifty dollars. Duplicate certificates will be issued for all deposits. The party depositing must endorse upon the original certificate the denomination of notes required, and whether they are to be issued in blank or payable to order. When so endorsed it must be left with the officer receiving the deposit, to be forwarded to this Department.

The notes will be transmitted to the owners free of transportation charges as soon after the receipt of the original Certificates of Deposit as they can be prepared. Interest will be allowed to August 15 on all deposits made prior to that date and will be paid by the Department upon receipt of the original certificates.

As the notes draw interest from August 15, persons making deposits subsequent to that date must pay the interest accrued from date of note to date of deposit. Rates depositing twenty-five thousand dollars and upwards for these notes at any one time will be allowed a commission of one quarter of one per cent, which will be paid by this Department upon the receipt of a bill for the amount, certified to by the officer with whom the deposit was made. No deductions for commissions must be made from the deposits.

MISCELLANEOUS. STATE OF MARYLAND. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. WHEREAS, The President of the United States has by his Proclamation of the 27th day of July last, called upon all the loyal and law-abiding citizens of the United States, to assemble in their several places of public worship on the FIRST THURSDAY OF AUGUST NEXT, and then there in a spirit of unanimity to endorse the Supreme Ruler of the World that the existing rebellion may be speedily suppressed; and that he will "not desist, nor suffer to be desisted from, until the rebellion is completely crushed, and the Union is restored to its former condition; and that he will grant us "that courage, power of resistance and endurance," necessary to secure our position among the family of Nations, and to beseech Him in His infinite goodness "to soften the hearts, enlighten the minds, and quicken the consciences of those in Rebellion, that they may lay down their arms and speedily return to their allegiance; and that the may be utterly destroyed, that the effusion of blood may be averted, and unity and concord restored to the Nation; Peace established throughout all our borders."

And whereas, These are prayers in which all can heartily unite, and are recommended in all the public prayers on the day above mentioned, and assembling in their usual places of public worship, to devoutly unite with their fellow citizens of other States in those appeals for blessing in which we are alike all so deeply interested.
