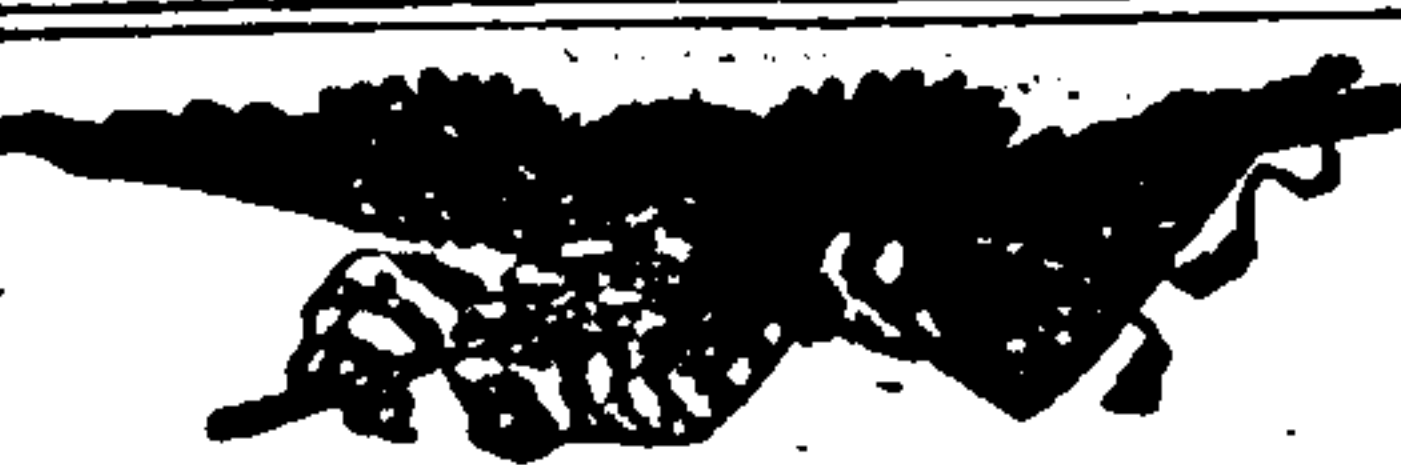

LOCAL NEWS.

The Meeting Last Night.—The mass meeting last night, held at the corner of Green and Portland streets was an imposing demonstration, and will add greatly to the ranks of the supporters of candidates for which the meeting was called.
