Another raid on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. At an early hour yesterday morning a force of rebel cavalry, on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, was probably captured and made his way into the borders of the city. The following are the particulars: Shortly after one o'clock on Monday afternoon, the rebels, estimated at between fifteen and twenty, were seen at the depot, where they were thrown up and defended by a small body of soldiers from Frederick City. Overcome by superior numbers, they were captured and taken to the depot, where they were held. A few minutes elapsed before the enemy was in possession of the post, but it is not positively known whether or not the capture was effected, as the rebels were seen to be breaking across the bridge at that time.
