Capture of a Blockade Runner—Dismas

Among the Citizens of Savannah

New York, January 4.—The steamer

Fallon, from Hilton Head on the 1st, has

arrived, with 1,100 passengers, including

500 officers of Gen. Sherman's army.

The gunboat Acacia has captured the

steamer Julia with 400 bales of cotton

from Charleston for Nassau. The Julia

arrived at Port Royal on the 23th.
