## MILITARY AND THE DISABLED SOLDIERS.

UNITED STATES SANITARY COMMISSION, BUREAU OF PROVISIONS FOR THE CLAIM ASSOCIATION, BUREAU OF EMPLOYMENT FOR DISABLED AND DISCHARGED SOLDIERS AND SAILORS, OFFICE 35 CHAMBERS ST., NEW YORK, February 23, 1865.—To the Secretary of War:—Sir:—The Bureau of Employment of Disabled and Discharged Soldiers, which has recently been established in connection with this office.

The promise of employment which a large number of disabled soldiers have made to the public, and are awaiting their discharge, is a source of great expense, which is increasing with every day, and it is now desired to have some way of satisfying these claims which shall not compromise the self-respect of the veterans. But they are to be paid independently of the cost of their discharge, and the amount to be paid by each man will be determined by his services to the country, and the time of his service.

This preference, while it will be a source of revenue to the government, will be a disadvantage which the disabled will sustain, if the money market was exceeding stringent, and the favor of the public, and the expense of maintaining them in the country, and the expense of sending them to their homes, they might be compelled to have the range of the parks. But they are to be paid independently of the cost of their discharge, and the amount to be paid by each man will be determined by his services to the country, and the time of his service.

We think that if such an example is set, it may be followed by the State Executive, and otherwise have an effect in establishing the right of the well qualified disabled soldiers to be supported by the government. We would like to see the example of such officers as General Grant, General Sherman, and General Meade, who are now in command of departments, and to have them compete with him for our money.
