## PROCEEDINGS

CHAIRPERSON LIEDER: I would like to call this meeting to order. We're here tonight -- today is October the 13th, 1987. We're here to hear a public comment on the town of Easton's Critical Area plan.

The purpose of this hearing is to allow anyone who wishes to speak to make comments about the plan, which has been proposed by Easton. This panel is here just to hear the comment, and transport those hearings back to the Commission. This panel does not make any findings, in particular, but I do want to tell the audience that the Commission will probably make a decision on the local program within 60 days of this hearing.

We have a court reporter here. We have a record being kept. So, there will be records available for anyone who wishes to know. The record will be kept open for one week, in addition, to receive written testimony, and that written testimony should be mailed to the Commission Chairman, Solomon Liss, in care of the Chesapeake Bay Critical Area Commission, 580 Taylor

I would like to introduce the members of the

panel. We have Steele Phillips from Dorchester County;

Dr. Shepard Krech from Talbot County; I'm Constance

Lieder; Ronald Adkins from Somerset County; and I would

like to call attention to -- in our audience, we have

Eugene Price, president of the town council; and we have

Roger Judd, the town engineer; and Chris Kehoe, the town

attorney. We also have with us Tony Redmond, the

consultant who prepared the plan for the town of Easton.

I have nothing else to say. Is there anyone who wishes to speak?

MR. REDMOND: I'll make one comment, as the town consultant working on the program; and that is, simply, to point out so that the record will reflect that the town has conducted a more heavily attended public hearing some six to seven weeks ago, which was held here at the town office, at which time I had made a formal presentation of all of the components of the local program, and had responded to questions, and answers were provided at that time. That may, in part,

CHAIRPERSON LIEDER: I think we also should point out that the panel did meet with town officials, and with the consultant, toured the area, and have had their -- any questions they had about the program addressed and answered.

MR. JUDD: I guess there is one -- excuse me -- CHAIRPERSON LIEDER: Yes, sir.

MR. JUDD: I guess there is one thing, on behalf of the town, if there are funds available, we would like to go on record as requiring, or requesting at this time in the preliminary stage, obviously, the allocation of appropriate funds for the implementation of this program when it is adopted.

MR. KRECH: Yes, Madam Chairman, I would like to make one comment; and that is -- that I made earlier this afternoon; and that is, I think the town of Easton, and the Planning Commission, and the planning administrator over there have really made a sincere effort to comply with the criteria, and we thank you.

CHAIRPERSON LIEDER: Well, I suppose we could read this as support for the plan in the attendance at the hearing.

I suppose we ought to keep the hearing open for a few more minutes to allow anybody who might come the opportunity --

MR. JUDD: I didn't introduce myself, and I think you all know I'm Roger Judd, the town engineer; and I act in the capacity of a consultant to the Planning Commission, and our Board of Appeals, among other chores. Mr. Redmond has acted as the Planning Commission, or the town's consultant for the preparation of this plan, and, certainly, the vast amount of the effort into bringing this thing together was his, in conjunction with the Planning Commission; and I would have to say that perhaps one reason the Planning Commission is not better represented here this evening is that they went through about a two and a half to three hour hearing this afternoon on a subdivision, which was just outside the Critical Area. I know they have been interested in the program, and they are

extremely interested in how the program will be administered.

I would make one pitch, if you will, for what I thought was a reasonable approach to the implementation of the plan; and that is, the idea of an overlay zone, which will, in effect, do just that -- overlay our existing, or any revised zoning within the Critical Areas -- and I asked Tony Redmond, our consultant, to -- in the implementation stage, to find methods whereby we can put the appropriate checks, if you will, within our existing administrative procedures: subdivision review, special exceptions, and so forth so that we would not have a whole other set of regulations to go to, if you will.

I think that if we are going to do an effective job in administering this program, that that is the way that it can be done with certain references within our existing building permit procedures, subdivision procedures, and so forth; and I think that we have approached that from that direction, and I hope that, if there is any possible way to simplify that

procedure, that we can achieve that, but it is going to be extremely difficult to administer the program as effectively as I'm sure that the Commission would like to see it administered, and we would like to see it done just that way: through additions to our standard procedures -- application procedures.

I think that's pretty much what we have tried to outline, and I believe that the panel has requested the staff, and the Commission has requested that we be more specific on where we're going to make those insertions, or additions in our existing regulations, and that's fine. I would like to see it, as well, so that we can put that on our checklist, and the staff can catch those things as they go by in their normal course of review for those kind of applications. And I just -- I think that it's important to make it -- obviously, you want to meet the criteria and administer the program, but I think it's important to make readily administratable, if that's the proper word. That's really -- I would ask that some consideration be given to that not only for the town of Easton, but for other
