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### PROCEEDINGS

MR. GUTMAN: All right. My name is James E. Gutman. I am a member of the Critical Area Commission and I will tonight serve as the Chairperson for this hearing that is being conducted by the Critical Area Commission. Our purpose is to hear from the citizens of the Town of Secretary concernign the plan that's been developed by Redman & Johnston. These are consultants to the Town who have prepared not only the text in the plan, but also the map. You may notice that the map, which may later be referred to is here on the wall to my right.

In attendance tonight are two additional members of the Commission and I think I'm going to ask both of them to introduce themselves, identifying the County which they represent on the Commission. Tom, please.

MR. JARVIS: Thomas L. Jarvis, Caroline County.

MR. PHILLIPS: Steele Phillips, Dorchester County.

MR. GUTMAN: Also in the matter of introductions, we have a member of the Staff of the Commission with us, Mr. Ed Phillips who has reviewed this plan and will be providing to the Staff of the Commission -- will be

providing staff comments to the consultants prior to the Commission itself taking any action on the plan.

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I would like us to mention some additional individuals who are present and would ask that if the Mayor, his Honor Walter Collins, would care to make any remarks, we would be pleased to hear from him.

MAYOR COLLINS: I don't have any remarks at this particular time.

MR. GUTMAN: All right. Let me know, sir, if at a later point you do have something you wish to put on the record. James Traverse is also with us, a member of the Town Commission.

MR. TRAVERSE: I don't have anything at this time, sir.

MR. GUTMAN: All right. I apologize for my pronounciation, but I believe it is Mr. Lewis Wanex?

MR. WANEX: Wanex, yes.

MR. GUTMAN: I beg your pardon. Sir, would you have any comments that you would care to make at this point?

MR. WANEX: No, not at this time.

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 MR. GUTMAN: All right. Well, if later on please do let me know.

MR. WANEX: I sure will.

MR. GUTMAN: And further, just to have everyone be aware, the proceedings tonight are being recorded by a court reporter, Mrs. Breta Bernstein will be taking down everything on the record so be assured if you have comments we will certainly address them in a timely fashion.

After tonight's meeting the record for comment on the plan will remain open for approximately a week so that those who may have anything that they care to provide in writing to the Commission can do so as long as they get their comments into the Commission no later than the 31st of the month, this would be Wednesday a week, and it would be by 4:00 p.m. Comments should be sent to the Chairman of the Commission --

MR. PHILLIPS: Could you make that noon, sir?

MR. GUTMAN: It will be changed to noon instead of 4:00 p.m.

MR. PHILLIPS: That is so we can act on that on that Wednesday if we so desire.

MR. GUTMAN: A correction. We will hold the record open until noon on Wednesday, August 31st. Comments -- written comments should be submitted to the Chairman of the Critical Area Commission and that would be Judge Solomon Liss, whose last name is spelled L-I-S-S, c/o Chesapeake Bay Critical Area Commission, Chesapeake Bay Critical Area Commission, 580 Taylor Avenue, D4, Annapolis, Maryland 21401.

All right. Generally we do have some rules that we abide by during these hearings. I don't intend to be strict, but we try to keep comments down to five minutes. We wish to make sure that comments that are made do relate to the plan and that's this volume that some of you may be familiar with in gray, and comments regarding the Critical Area Act itself are really not the thrust of tonight's hearing. We are principally interested in what you think of the plan that's been put together by the consultants and that plan is designed to meet the criteria established by the General Assembly developed by the Critical Area Commission.

I think what we will do now is to provide an

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opportunity to the consultant to briefly explain what they have done in developing the plan for the Town of Secretary and I'll ask that they try to hold their presentation to no more than twenty minutes.

MR. GRIFFITH: Thank you, sir, and members of the Panel. I don't think it will take that long.

MR. GUTMAN: And your name for the record, please?

MR. GRIFFITH: Oh, my name for the record is

Barry Griffith. I'm representing the firm Redman/Johnston

& Associates of Easton, Maryland and with me here tonight
is Mr. Peter Johnston, a principle in our firm.

To start a brief chronology of the events that have led to the preparation of this plan, the first draft was prepared by our firm March 4th and submitted to the Town for their review. In preparing the draft we actually did the Land Management Classification Mapping, the IDA, LDA, RCA Map, and we relied upon maps prepared for the Dorchester County that took into account the natural resource features that affected the Town.

After our submission of the draft to the Town on March 4th, we came to the Town and gave a briefing on the

program and explained to the Town Commissioners exactly what the program meant in terms of development in Secretary and so forth and then shortly after that a public hearing was held on or about May 11th. Later in May the draft of the Critical Area Program was submitted to the Critical Area Commission for their review and in June the Town received back the Critical Area Commission comments that were approved at a meeting in Annapolis.

The program was subsequently revised to address those comments and recommendations and resubmitted to the Critical Area Commission in July. That's been the action to date and I will point out that the comments that were sent back to the Town basically were very minor in nature. Really no substantive changes to the content of the program. These changes were made and I believe that you will find upon your review of the program that it is complete in all of its requirements relating to the law on the criteria.

Just a short brief about the Town and its program. Secretary is basically a built out small community. As you can see from the map the majority of land that has

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been classified is in the Intensely Developed Area category with about sixty-nine acreas in that category, sixty-two acreas in the Limited Development Area, which basically consists of some undeveloped larger parcels. The entire shoreline of the Town has been designated as a Buffer Exemption Area due to the nature of the development present along all reaches of the shoreline. There is no Rural Conservation Area within the Town.

In is anticipated --

MR. GUTMAN: Excuse me. You use the word "Rural Conservation", did you intend to say resource?

MR. GRIFFITH: Resource. I'm sorry, sir. Resource Conservation Area. It's anticipated that any extensive new development in the Town would probably be a function of annexation of lands currently outside of the Town boundaries within the County jurisdiction presently.

Other than what I have just said, I think that you would find in reviewing the program the Town has no significant problems with what's being proposed in the program. There doesn't seem to be any extremely controversial issues related to the program. It's fairly

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straight forward and to the point, I believe. I would be happy to answer any questions then if anybody has one.

MR. JOHNSTON: Barry, were there any significant resource on the mapping that was done by Norman Day?

MR. GRIFFITH: No, there was not.

MR. JOHNSTON: So, there's no major wildlife, plant-wildlife habitat?

MR. GRIFFITH: That's correct.

MR. JOHNSTON: No threatening danger, none of those types of issues?

MR. GRIFFITH: None of those were identified that exist within the Town limits.

MR. JOHNSTON: Okay.

MR. GUTMAN: All right. We'll now entertain either questions or comments. If anyone has any problems or if they have a position they wish to put on the record, we will be glad to take them at this point.

MAYOR COLLINS: I've got one question as Mayor of Secretary. I would like to know if and when the Town did, if ever, decide to annex property outside of the Town limits naturally, would it fall under the County's

jurisdiction as far as Critical Areas, or will we have to adopt another policy to cover that?

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MR. GUTMAN: I'll let Mr. Phillips answer that.

MR. ED PHILLIPS: If you would annex property outside of the Town limits, then that would be your property and the ordinances that you adopt in conformity with the criteria would then apply to the annexed section. If what you would have to do would have to go through the amendments of your plan in principally your maps to include this area, and that then would make that part of the Town and the ordinances that you have would apply to that section. So, it would be under your jurisdiction but you would have to amend your maps to include the additional area that you would take in and if you did change the classification which would be different from what the County has classified it, then you would have to -that would be included as part of your amendement to your plan and your maps. So, it would come under the jurisdiction completely of the Town.

MR. GUTMAN: All right. Are there other comments, does anyone care to state a position. All right, seeing

no one indicating that they wanted to speak further on the record, it's my intention to adjourn the hearing. without objection the hearing now stands adjourned. (Whereupon, the hearing was adjourned at 7:26 p.m.)
