MR. GUTMAN: My name is James E. Gutman. I am a member of the Critical Area Commission and tonight am serving as the Chairman for this hearing on the plan, as well as the map, for the Town of Vienna. I would like to make a few other introductions before we ask for comments. First, there are two other commissioners on the Critical Area Commission that are members of this panel and I'd like them each to introduce themselves, if they would. First, Tom.

MR. JARVIS: Thomas R. Jarvis, Caroline County.

MR. PHILLIPS: G. Steele Phillips, Dorchester County.

MR. GUTMAN: In addition with us is Mr. Ed Phillips who is a staff person on the -- for the Critical Area Commission and he's in the corner. In addition we have the two members of the consulting team of Redman/Johnston with us. If they would introduce themselves.

MR. JOHNSTON: I'm Peter Johnsont, Redman/Johnston Associates.

MR. GRIFFITH: And I'm Barry Griffith of Redman/

MR. GUTMAN: Additionally tonight I would like to introduce our court reporter who is taking everything down on the record, and Mrs. Berta Bernstien is handling the equipment for the record that will be kept of this particular hearing.

MR. HURLEY: Is it Bernstien or Bernstein?

REPORTER: Pardon?

MR. HURLEY: Is it Bernstien or Bernstein?

REPORTER: Well, we pronounce it Bernstein, and my first name is Breta B R E T A.

MR. GUTMAN: Excuse me, I apologize.

REPORTER: That's okay.

MR. GUTMAN: The Commissioners are here with us and I would like to introduce first the President, Mr. Dewey Blades. I would ask if at this time you would have any statement you would care to make?

MR. BLADES: I have none at this present time, sir.

MR. GUTMAN: All right. Another Commissioner is

Mr. Harold Richardson.

MR. RICHARDSON: I'm here.

MR. GUTMAN: And I would inquire if you have any--

MR. RICHARDSON: None at this moment.

MR. GUTMAN: -- remarks, and Mr. Allen Harley --

MR. HURLEY: Hurley.

MR. GUTMAN: -- Hurley, another Commissioner for the Town. Any statement that you would like to make at

this time?

MR. HURLEY: Well, I reserve that until later,

MR. GUTMAN: All right. Well, let me know when you're ready, sir. All right. I would just like to proceed and mention a few items regarding this hearing. The hearing record after tonight will remain open for a little over a week for anyone who would care to write in comments about the plan may do so sending that to the Critical Area Commission prior to noon on Wednesday, the 31st of August. The record will remain open until noon, Wednesday, August 31. Written comments should be sent to the Chairman of the Commission, Judge Solomon Liss, L-I-S-S, Chesapeake Bay Critical Area Commission, 580 Taylor Avenue, Room No. would be D4, Annapolis, Maryland 21401. So, there is a

week that is available for anyone who does not care to complete their comments tonight may do so in writing before this Wednesday a week.

Comments tonight we would like to hold to five minutes. Please recognize that this is a hearing where the Commission wants to hear from the Public about the plan. This is not to be related to the comments dealing with the Critical Area Legislation itself or the criteria developed by the Commission.

Further, the Commissioners will not be responding and providing information to questions. Our purpose is to get information exclusively about the plan from those who live in the area and are going to be affected by this Critical Area Plan.

All right. I think before we go further, I'm going to ask that a representative of the Planning Group that was -- the consultant that authored the plan and has been working with the Staff of the Commission to make a presentation of what they have done. So, if you will, Mr. Griffith, I would like for you to address the substance of this.

MR. GRIFFITH: Thank you, Mr. Gutman, members of the panel. I'll keep my comments brief. First a chronology of how the process has evolved to date. The first draft was prepared by our firm and delivered to the Town for their review and consideration on or about March 7th.

Our firm, in addition to preparing the text, prepared the Land Classification Map for the Town. The Natural Resource Features Maps that were used for the Town's program are the County Maps for Dorchester County.

Following our submission of our draft to the Town we held a briefing with the Town Commissioners and Planning Commission to go over that draft and at that point some revisions were recommended and made. The Town held its first public hearing on May 4th, and subsequent to that public hearing myself and Mr. Peter Johnston once again met with the Town Commissioners to consider and add some additional revisions to the document, to the draft program.

On or about late May that program was submitted to the Critical Area Commission for their review and consideration and then in June they received their comments

back from the Critical Area Commission and I will remark that the comments that were received at that time were basically minor in nature and no major substantive changes to the program were requested. Those revisions were made and the program was revised and resubmitted back to the Commission for their final review and approval on or about July 8th.

A few brief comments about the Town's program and I'll reference the map that's hanging on the wall, over here the Land Classification Map. Basically you'll note there is no Resource Conservation Area designated for the Town. The majority of the Town is in a Limited Development Area Classification with some sections, particularly along the waterfront in the Intensely Developed Area designation.

I'll also point out that the Natural Resource
Mapping provided by the County indicated no significant
natural features present in the Town.

In addition to what you see on the wall and the map, I think you'll find that the draft program that was submitted does address all of the requirements of the criteria and law that the State has put forward.

I would also like to point out to you the drawings in the center of the wall, the Vienna Waterfront Plan. This Plan was prepared for the Town in 1983 and it basically proposes the conversion of privately owned land that's currently on the southside of Water Street, it's currently abandoned and vacant land and there are some old buildings and concrete foundations and slabs on this site. It's the Town's intention to acquire this land and redevelop it as a passive recreational waterfront park with replantings of vegetation and the creation of some wooded boardwalk areas to make it a town park.

In addition, the wetland that you notice in the very southern portion of the Town has also been identified as a possible candidate site as a natural park area within the Town.

Excepting these two special features the rest of the Town and the program, I believe you will find is generally in compliance with the criterion law and everything seems to be in order from our standpoint this far.

MR. GUTMAN: All right. I'll now ask Mr. Phillips

if he has any comments to make at this point before we seek testimony from others.

MR. PHILLIPS: No, the comments of the staff have been received or were received by the consultants and those changes have been made and everything seems to be in good shape.

MR. GUTMAN: All right. Well, I think we're now ready to hear from anyone who cares to make comments about the plan of Vienna, any issues or problems, anything you care to put on the record about the plan. So, if any one wishes to speak this is an opportunity to do so.

MR. HURLEY: Any comments, Harold?

MR. RICHARDSON: No.

MR. HURLEY: I think we pretty well understand,
I think Dee or Steve --

MR. DEWEY: We have two members of the Planning Commission here, Dee Reinhart and Mr. Steve Hurst. Do either of you two have anything to say on behalf of the Planning Commission?

MRS. REINHART: No.

MR. HURST: I think you've pretty well covered it.

MR. GUTMAN: All right. Well, seeing no one who cares to go on the record with comments about the plan I see no further reason to continue the hearing and we will merely repeat that the record will remain open until noon of Wednesday a week, the 31st of August after which time, of course, we will consider material before us and ultimately this will be reviewed by the staff, the panel and taken to the full Commission for action. So again, not seeing anyone who cares to speak on the record I will announce that the hearing is adjourned.

(Whereupon, the hearing was adjourned 8:45 p.m.)
