DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The John Callahan House originally stood on a corner lot at the intersection of College and Bladen Streets. In its original location the house was situated adjacent to the intersection corner of its lot, so that what is now the southeast corner of the building was directly on the property line with a sidewalk built up against it. At its next location the house was so closely hemmed in on three sides by neighboring buildings that obtaining a favorable view of it was nearly impossible. Now, however, it has been moved to Conduit Street in front of the new city parking garage adjacent to the Lloyd Dulaney House. In its present location it is easily viewed from all directions.

In spite of its two movings, the main portion of the house has suffered few irremediable alterations, and it survives in generally sound structural condition. The Callahan House is 2 1/2 stories high, covered by a steep gable roof pierced by dormers apparently of a later date. The chimneys at the east and west ends feature a hound's tooth course around the top. The east chimney has been reduced in width at a later date. The four-bay north front and the three-bay west, or entrance front are laid up in very fine Flemish bond while the south, or rear, facade is laid in English bond (one course headers to one of stretchers) as is the east wall. The water table is capped with a course of molded brick; the water table itself has been covered with scored stucco. The windows on the north and west walls are capped with finely executed gauged brick lintels undercut with segmented curves. Most of the windows in the house amazingly retain their original sashes. The decorative window on the third floor of the west wall has a round headed top and has interlacing mullions. The Callahan House's noted doorway occupies the southern bay on the main facade. It is similar to Plate XLVII of Batty Langley's The City and Country Builders and Workmans Treasury of Designs, (London, 1750). A Doric pediment crowns the doorway supported on a Doric entablature and fluted Doric pilasters. The doorway also has panelled reveals and its original panelled door.

A photograph taken circa 1890 reveals a porch running the entire length of the (now) south side. The south wall is plastered on the first floor, in the area which was bounded by the porch. This same photograph shows a two story service wing that was attached to what is now the southeast corner of the house. A 2 1/2 story addition was added after the move to St. John's Street which greatly disfigured the house at the corner where the service wing used to stand. When this addition was removed some of the original walls of the house came with it. This section is now filled in with cinder block prior to restoration.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The John Callahan House is one of the few remaining upper-middle class Annapolis houses dating from the mid-1780's.<sup>1</sup>

The builder was John Callahan, a prominent late eighteenth century Annapolitan. He served as Register of Land Records for the western shore of Maryland during the Revolution and was a lieutenant colonel in the militia from 1794 to 1795. He was well thought of in Annapolis, for he served as a trustee of the estates of William Paca, signer of the Declaration of Independence, and of Samuel Middleton, owner of the recently restored Middleton's Tavern at the Annapolis dock.

Callahan married a daughter of architect William Buckland, who came to Annapolis in the 1770's to work on what is now the Hammond Harwood House.

The Callahan House originally stood on Bladen Street across from the State House. At the turn of the century the construction of State buildings threatened the continued existence of the building. A new site was found on St. John Street and the house was moved (from November 1900 through January 1901) with its owners, the Misses Pinkney, in residence.

In 1928 St. John's College purchased the house for a dormitory. Four decades later the State again wanted the site of the house for new construction. The Maryland Historical Trust saved the building from certain demolition by finding it a third site. In the fall of 1972 the house was moved through downtown Annapolis to its new location on Conduit Street. The State of Maryland conveyed title to the property to the City of Annapolis; the Maryland Historical Trust holds an interior and exterior easement to insure its preservation.





Distinguished in the City of Annapolis for its unusual gable-end principal facade and its largely intact Georgian/Federal interior finishes, the John Callahan house, built around 1785-90, has been moved twice in efforts to prevent its demolition. Originally erected on the corner of Tabernacle (College) and Lawyer (Bladen) streets, the house was relocated to St. John's Street in 1900-01, and then to its present site on Conduit Street in 1972. The well-crafted Flemish and English bond elevations are marked by regularly spaced twelve-over-twelve and twelve-over-eight sash window openings featuring brick jack arches undercut with a segmental arch. The pedimented front entrance is particularly noteworthy with its fluted pilasters that rise to a Doric frieze articulated with triglyphs. Fixed in the upper gable end is a round arched window with interlacing muntins. The house is significant also for its intact interiors of 1780s Georgian-Federal woodwork. The first and second floors follow a four-room disposition with the stairhall located in the front, southwest corner. The cylindrical turned newel post and three rectangular balusters per tread support a molded handrail that ramps as it meets the first landing. The stringer is embellished with a Federal scroll decoration. Also distinguishing the interior are built-in shutters on the first floor and original six-panel doors, ogee backband surround moldings, and several original mantels.

Credit for the construction of this well appointed brick house is awarded to John Callahan (c. 1754-1803), a prominent and wealthy Annapolitan who served as the Register of the Western Shore Land Office between 1778 and 1803. John Callahan married Sarah Buckland, architect William Buckland's daughter, on June 22, 1783. Shortly afterwards Callahan acquired portions

of Lot 75 in two transactions, the first in January 1785 and a second in November 1787. The architectural character of the interior woodwork combines baroque robustness evident in the ogee backbands and deeply set raised-panel doors with the neoclassical refinements found in the stair and mantel designs. These elements strongly point to the mid 1780s as a construction date. Parallel woodwork is also found at George Mann's tavern house (AA-437), also erected during the mid 1780s.

John Callahan was assessed for his property in 1798, and the federal officials described the property as

One Brick Dwelling House Two Story 35 by 32, one Brick Kitchen 24 by 20, Single Story Brick Smoak House, 10 by 10, Milk House 5 by 5, and Frame House 25 by 20, One Frame Stable 32 by 15

The brick house, five outbuildings, and the ½ acre lot were valued at \$1,300. John Callahan owned 2 slaves as well. John Callahan remained at the corner of Tabernacle and Lawyer streets until his death in 1803, when the property passed to his wife Sarah and their children. He made an unusual stipulation in his will that no inventory was to be made until Sarah Callahan's death. As a result, the estate remained open for several decades to follow. Finally, in 1831, Sarah Callahan petitioned the Chancery Court in order to settle her husband's unresolved legacy by obtaining clear title to the property in order to sell it. The court ordered that the real estate described in the testimony was Sarah Callahan's and that she had the right to dispose of it. Two years later, on October 31, 1833, Sarah Callahan sold the two-and-a-half story brick house and part of Lot 75 to Somerville Pinkney for \$2,500. The property remained in the Pinkney family through the balance of the nineteenth century. Somerville and Mary Pinkney's two maiden

daughters were the residents when the house was relocated to St. John's Street in 1900-01.

Following the deaths of the Pinkney sisters, the property was acquired by St. John's College and used as a dormitory and infirmary until the late 1960s when it was threatened with demolition.

Historic Annapolis, Inc. intervened in order to save the house, and the preservation group worked out an long-term lease with the understanding that Historic Annapolis would restore the house on its new, city-owned site on Conduit Street. This arrangement lasted until 1983 when the property was sold to the present owner.

The John Callahan house, also known as the Pinkney-Callahan house, is located at 164 Conduit Street in the heart of the central business district of Annapolis, Anne Arundel County, Maryland. The house faces west with the gable roof oriented on an east/west axis. In efforts to preserve this important late eighteenth century house, it has been moved twice; first during late 1900 when it was moved from its original site on the southeast corner of Bladen and College Avenue to St. John's Street about a block away, and second, when it was relocated from St. John's Street in 1972 to its current location on Conduit Street.

Estimated to date around 1785-90, the John Callahan house is a two-and-a-half story, three-bay by four-bay Flemish bond brick dwelling with a gable end elevation serving as the principal entrance facade. The four-room plan house is supported on a raised block foundation sheathed with an English bond brick veneer and a beveled watertable. The front (Conduit Street) wall is laid in Flemish bond as is the north side (Gorman Street) elevation. The mortar is struck with a grapevine joint. The south (side) and east (rear) walls are laid in English bond. The walls rise to a steeply pitched, dormered gable roof covered with slate.

The west (main) elevation is a balanced three-bay facade with the principal entrance fixed in the southern bay. The raised six-panel door is framed by a classical pedimented surround. Fluted pilasters rise to Doric frieze articulated by triglyphs. Fixed atop the frieze is a triangular pediment accented with fine dentil bed moldings. Enhancing the entrance as well are raised panel reveals. The two adjacent bays are filled with twelve-over-twelve sash windows surmounted with finely laid brick jack arches undercut with a segmental arch. The second floor is marked by three evenly spaced twelve-over-eight sash windows accented with brick jack arches and undercut with a segmental arch. Distinguishing the gable end is a round arched window featuring interlacing muntins. The gable end is dominated by a narrow proportioned chimney stack finished with a corbelled cap.

The north (Gorman Street) elevation is a four-bay facade with four twelve-over-twelve sash windows lighting the first floor and four twelve-over-eight sash windows illuminating the second floor. The windows feature brick jack arches with undercut segmental arches. Piercing the foundation are four segmental arched window openings recreated after the house was moved. The window frames have horizontal diamond cross-sectioned bars. The base of the roof is finished with a boxed cornice, and a pair of gabled nineteenth century dormers light the attic. The six-over-six sash windows are framed by paneled pilasters. The sides of the dormers are covered with slate.

## 7.1 DESCRIPTION

John Callahan House, AA-680

164 Conduit Street

Annapolis, Anne Arundel County, Maryland

The south side elevation is three bays across with a center entrance flanked by twelve-over-twelve sash windows. The eastern (right) portion of the wall has been rebuilt. Three twelve-over-eight sash windows light the second floor. Finishing the base of the roof is a boxed cornice trimmed with bold bed and crown moldings. The roof is marked by a pair of gabled six-over-six sash dormers. The sides of the dormers are sheathed with slate, and the edge of the dormer roof is trimmed with a crown molding with short returns on the front face.

The rear (east) wall is a symmetrical three-bay facade with twelve-over-twelve sash windows lighting the first floor and twelve-over-eight sash windows illuminating the second floor. A series of three, four-over-four sash windows light the attic. Rising through the gable end is an interior end chimney stack of smaller proportions than the front stack. It is finished with a corbelled cap.

The floor plan follows a four-room disposition with an entrance hall located in the front, southwest corner. North of the hall are the two principal downstairs rooms of approximately equal size, while a third room is located in the southeast corner. The hall contains a quarter turn staircase distinguished with late eighteenth century Federal finishes. The cylindrical turned newel post and three rectangular balusters support a molded handrail that ramps as it meets the first landing. The stringer is embellished with a scroll decoration. The cellar stair is located beneath the main stair, although the door to the cellar stairwell has been removed. The window and door surrounds feature a boldly molded three-part surround with a robust ogee backband, a lower profile ogee middle molding and a beaded edge. The walls are also trimmed with heavy chair rail and baseboard moldings. The chair rail, embellished with a repeating triglyph motif, stretches around the room at window sill height. The windows also feature built-in folding shutters with paneled fronts. Six-panel doors, framed by ogee backband surrounds, open into the adjacent rooms.

The northwest (front) parlor is a squarish space with a large double door opening on its east wall. Ten-panel double-leaf doors are framed by a molded surround. The outside window openings feature ogee backband surrounds and built-in shutters. Trimming the walls as well is a plastered cornice, triglyph decorated chair rail, and a baseboard molding. Centered on the west wall is a projecting chimney breast accented with a mid-nineteenth century black marble mantel. Plain pilasters rise to a plain frieze, which is topped by a thick shelf.

## 7.2 DESCRIPTION

John Callahan House, AA-680

Annapolis, Anne Arundel County, Maryland

The room behind is of equal size and is entered through a raised six-panel hall door or by way of the large double doors that pierce the center partition. The raised panel double doors have large inset throw bolts with brass knobs. The room is generously lighted by four large size twelve-over-twelve sash windows designed with built-in shutters and framed by ogee backband surrounds. The triglyph embellished chair rail stretches around the perimeter of the room, which is also trimmed with a molded baseboard and a plaster cornice. Centered on the north wall is a Federal mantel that features paneled pilasters, fluted frieze blocks, and a broken profile mantel shelf. The small room that occupies the southeast corner of the first floor is entered from the hall by way of a new six-panel door accented with a late eighteenth century ogee backband surround.

The second floor is divided in a similar fashion with the upstairs hall providing access to two large rooms on the north side of the house and a smaller space (now bathrooms) located in the southeast corner. The upstairs hall contains the attic stair, which continues with a closed stringer to the next landing and a series of square balusters support a molded handrail. The upper portion of the attic stair is enclosed, however a small four-pane window pierces the side wall allowing natural light to illuminate the landing. Trimming the second floor hall wall is a less elaborate chair rail and a simple beaded baseboard molding. The windows and doors are framed by a less complex ovolo molded backband surround, which has a beaded inner edge. There are no built-in shutters on the second floor.

The main rooms on the north side of the house are finished in the same fashion with six-panel doors opening into each space. Federal mantels with paneled pilasters and fluted frieze block also feature broken profile mantel shelves with a dentil bed molding. The southeast corner of the second floor is divided into two modern bathrooms.

The attic has been partitioned with new walls and door finishes. There is a second quarter of the nineteenth century Greek Revival mantel in the northwest room that frames the fireplace.

Distinguished in the City of Annapolis for its unusual gable-front principal facade and its largely intact Georgian/Federal interior finishes, the John Callahan house, built around 1785-90, has been moved twice in efforts to save it from demolition. Originally erected on the corner of Tabernacle (College) and Lawyer (Bladen) streets, the house was relocated to St. John's Street in 1900-01, and then to its present site on Conduit Street in 1972. The well-crafted Flemish and English bond elevations are distinguished by regularly spaced twelve-over-twelve and twelve-over-eight window openings featuring brick jack arches undercut with a segmental arch. The pedimented front entrance is particularly noteworthy as well with fluted pilasters that rise to a Doric frieze articulated with triglyphs. Fixed in the upper gable end is a round arched window with interlacing muntins. The house is significant as well for its intact interiors of 1780s Georgian/Federal woodwork. The first and second floors follow a four-room disposition with the stairhall located in the front, southwest corner. The cylindrical turned newel post and three rectangular balusters per tread support a molded handrail that ramps as it meets the first landing. The stringer is embellished with a Federal scroll decoration. Also distinguishing the interior are built-in shutters on the first floor and original six-panel doors, ogee backband surround moldings, and several original mantels.

Credit for the construction of this well-designed brick house is awarded to John Callahan (c. 1754-1803), a prominent and wealthy Annapolitan who served as the Register of the Western Shore Land Office between 1778 and 1803.(1) John Callahan married Sarah Buckland, architect William Buckland's daughter, on June 22, 1783.(2) Shortly afterwards Callahan acquired portions of Lot 75 in two transactions, the first in January 1785 and a second in November 1787.(3) The architectural character of the interior woodwork combines a baroque robustness evident in the bold ogee backbands and deeply set raised-panel doors with neoclassical refinements found in the stair and mantel designs. These elements strongly point to the mid 1780s as a construction date. Parallel woodwork is also found at George Mann's Tavern house, also erected during the mid 1780s.

John Callahan was assessed for his property in 1798, and the federal officials described the property as

One Brick Dwelling House Two Story 35 by 32, one Brick Kitchen 24 by 20, Single Story Brick Smoak House, 10 by 10, Milk House 5 by 5, and Frame House 25 by 20, One Frame Stable 32 by 15

The brick house, five outbuildings, and the ½ acre lot were valued at \$1,300. John Callahan owned 2 slaves as well.(4) John Callahan remained at the corner of Tabernacle and Lawyer streets until his death in 1803, when the property passed to his wife Sarah and their children.(5) He made an unusual stipulation in his will that no inventory was to be made until Sarah Callahan's death. As a result, the estate remained open for several decades to follow. Finally, in 1831, Sarah Callahan petitioned the Chancery Court in order to settle her husband's unresolved legacy by obtaining clear title to the property in order to sell it.(6) The court ordered that the real estate described in the testimony was Sarah Callahan's and that she had the right to dispose of it. Two years later, on October 31, 1833, Sarah Callahan sold the two-and-a-half story brick house and part of Lot 75 to Somerville Pinkney for \$2,500.(7) The property remained in the Pinkney family through the balance of the nineteenth century. Somerville and Mary Pinkney's two maiden daughters were the residents when it was relocated to St. John's Street in 1900-01. An article published on January 24, 1901 in the *Evening Capital* detailed the events of the relocation.

The Pinkney House, the moving of which was begun two months ago, and which has been a wonder to the citizens and visitors of Annapolis, now rests over its new foundation on North street extended, on the Claude property, next to the new residence of Dr. W. C. Claude.

The lot on which this house formerly stood has been purchased by the State as part of the site of its new State Building, and the owners, the "Misses Pinkney," reserved the house. About the 10th of November, the contractors, Thomas S. Spicknall & Co. of 541 North Fulton street, Baltimore, began to underpin the house to remove it from the corner of Bladen street and College Avenue to a lot on St. John's street, a distance, including the turning of the house around to bring the front door on St. John's street, of 300 feet. (8)

## 8.2 SIGNIFICANCE

John Callahan House, AA-680

Following the deaths of the Pinkney sisters, the house was acquired by St. John's College and used as a dormitory and infirmary until the late 1960s when it was threatened with demolition. Historic Annapolis, Inc. intervened in order to save the house, and the preservation group worked out a long-term lease with the understanding that Historic Annapolis would restore the house on its new, city-owned site on Conduit Street. This arrangement lasted until 1983 when the property was sold to the present owner.(9)

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Pinkney-Callahan House originally stood on a corner lot at the intersection of College and Bladen Streets. In its original location the house was situated adjacent to the intersection corner of its lot, so that what is now the southeast corner of the building was directly on the property line with a sidewalk built up against it. In its present location the house is so closely hemmed in on three sides by neighboring buildings that obtaining a favorable view of it is nearly impossible.

In spite of the moving, the main portion of the house has suffered few irremediable alterations, and it survives in generally sound structural condition. The rectangular brick building stands 2 1/2 stories high and is covered by a steep gable roof pierced by dormers that are probably not original. At the base of each side of the roof is a simple, molded cornice and at each end is a wide interior-end chimney featuring a hound's-tooth course around the cap. The west chimney has been reduced in width at a later date. The four-bay south front and the three-bay east, or entrance front, are laid up in very fine flemish bond, while the north, or rear wall, is laid in English bond. The west wall is completely hidden in vines so that it is impossible to determine either the brick bond or any alterations to the openings. The beveled water table around the base of the house has been covered over with scored stucco. The windows on the south and east wall are embellished with finely executed gauged brick lintels undercut with segmented curves. Most of the windows in the house amazingly retain their original sash. The decorative window on the third floor of the east wall has a round-headed top and features interlacing tracery in the upper portion. In the first floor north bay of the east wall is the Pinkney-Callahan House's noted doorway. The composition of this doorway incorporates a Doric pediment and entablature supported on fluted Doric pilasters. The doorway also has paneled reveals and its original paneled door.

On the rear wall of the house is a portion of an early one story porch which at one time extended across the entire first floor, of that side. A photograph of the house taken prior to its moving shows that there was a two-story service wing located at what is now the northwest corner of the house. Portions of this wing apparently were moved with the house, but the corner where it originally joined the main section has been much disfigured by a twentieth century, 2 1/2 story addition being placed there. Sections of the service wing's original English bond walls can be seen, but the floor levels have been raised along with the over-all height of the walls.

The plan of the Pinkney-Callahan House is similar to that of Ogle Hall, having the entrance and stair hall located against the rear wall, and the two principal rooms located against the

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Although not widely known because of its obscure location, the Callahan-Pinkney House is a significant example of colonial craftsmanship and design, and ranks among the major architectural monuments of Annapolis. The construction date of this notable Georgian house is unknown, but stylistic evidence indicates that it was probably built in the mid-eighteenth century. Its many architectural similarities to Ogle Hall (built circa 1740), such as the side entrance, the steep gable roof, the wide interior-end chimneys, and the treatment of the brickwork all serve to support a mid-eighteenth century construction date. Also, the nearly identical treatment of the Pinkney-Callahan House's Doric style doorway to the doorway on the west front of Montpelier, Prince George County (circa 1751), further suggests a mid-eighteenth century date. One of the most handsome in the city, this doorway is probably based on plate XLVII of Batty Langley's The City and Country Builders and Workman's Treasury of Designs, (London, 1750).

The builder and the first owner of the Pinkney-Callahan House is also uncertain. It is known, however, that the house was acquired in the 1770's by John Callahan (1750-1803). A prominent Annapolitan, Callahan is mentioned in the accounts of Christopher Richmond in connection with services rendered the Maryland troops during the Revolutionary War.

John Callahan married Sarah, the second daughter of William Buckland, the architect (1734-1774). The John Callahan's daughter, the William Bucklands' granddaughter, Sally, married Richard Harwood on March 29, 1803, Treasurer of the Western Shore of Maryland. Harwood owned and resided in the Hammond-Harwood House on Maryland Avenue, Annapolis. The Hammond-Harwood House was designed by Sally Callahan Harwood's architect grandfather, William Buckland, and is considered by architectural historians to be one of the finest examples of Georgian-style mansions in this country. Three portraits, one of John Callahan, one of his wife, and one of his children, by Charles Wilson Peale, are exhibited at the Hammond-Harwood House (1971).

John Callahan also served as Commissioner of the Land office (see Continuation Sheet)

It is hoped that further, more detailed study of the interior of this significant house can reveal more of its exact original appearance.

and was the intimate of several important Annapolis figures. He is listed as being a trustee of the estates of William Paca, Samuel Middleton, and George Mann. Following Callahan's death in 1803 ownership of the house passed to his widow, Sarah Buckland Callahan. Thirty years later she sold it to Somerville Pinkney, a local attorney. Pinkney's two maiden daughters inherited the house following the deaths of their parents, and retained ownership until their deaths in the early twentieth century.

During the winter of 1900-1901 the house was moved from its original location on Bladen Street, some 300 feet east, to a lot on St. John's Street, in order to make way for the construction of the Court of Appeals Building. The Pinkney sisters are said to have remained lining in the house during the six weeks move, and even to have served tea there one afternoon.

In 1928 the house was acquired by St. John's College and since that time it has been used as a dormitory and infirmary. At the present time the house is threatened with demolition by the State of Maryland which has an option on the property and intends to use it for further expansion of state office buildings.







Obscured by the Baptist Church on College Avenue and by heavy (summer) foliage, the Pinkney House, moved onto St. John's, is a good example of a Georgian Maryland town house -- Flemish bond, massive end chimneys, 0/6 roof dormers, arched windows (12/9 and 9/9) with splayed brick lintels and a 3rd storey Venetian window with Gothic sash. This window, as well as the classical, pedimented doorway complete with metapes, triglyphs, frieze, dentils, and fluted pilasters show refined nature of the Pinkney House. Preservation important, though could be better located for greater appreciation and contribution.




