The Church of God of Anderson (Indiana) is located on the north side of Annapolis Road (Rt. 175) between the towns of Odenton and Gambrills in north central Anne Arundel County.

The frame church building, built in 1921, is a rectangular, 4 bay by 3 bay, one-story frame structure covered by a gable roof. The gable end facade faces southwest toward Annapolis Road, and is distinguished by a square, two-story, projecting bell-tower which occupies the central bay of the facade. The principal entrance into the church is located on the facade of the tower.

This church building is typical of small, rural, rectangular-shaped churches built during the late 19th and early 20th centuries throughout the country. This form had widespread use as school, church, and grange hall buildings during this period.

The Church of God of Anderson (Indiana) is located on the north side of Annapolis Road (Rt. 175) between the towns of Odenton and Gambrills in north central Anne Arundel County. The church congregation erected a brick church to the southeast sometime during the last decade, to replace this earlier structure.

The frame church, built in 1921, is a rectangular, 4 bay by 3 bay, one-story frame structure covered by a gable roof. The gable end facade faces southwest toward Annapolis Road, and is distinguished by a square, two-story, projecting bell-tower which occupies the central bay of the facade. The principal entrance into the church is located on the facade of the tower.

The church rests on a very high poured concrete foundation. The raised basement once housed the Sunday School classes. The exterior walls of the church are covered with wood shingles and the roof with asphalt shingles. The rafter ends have been left exposed on both side elevations (southeast and northwest).

The bell tower is adorned with a pent which wraps around the tower at the first-story level. The rafter ends of the pent have also been left exposed. Two Gothic-arched ventilators pierce the southeast and northwest elevations of the tower at the second-story level. A circular opening is located on the facade of the tower. This may have once been a window; it is now filled with the Boy Scout Troop #755 plaque. (The troop presently uses the building for their meetings and functions.) The bell tower is crowned with the open framework which once supported a bell, and covered by a pyramidal roof with flared eaves, the top of which is adorned by a simple cross. The bell was removed and installed at the newer brick church located to the southeast.

The main entrance, located on the facade of the bell tower, consists of a double wood-paneled door and is accessed by a poured concrete stair. The raised basement is accessed by a door located in the rear of the church.

The sanctuary is lit by four long, 2/2 sash windows on both side elevations. Two Gothic-arch, sash windows flank the bell tower on the facade. The raised basement is lit by four, 2/2 sash windows on both side elevations.

An exterior gable-end brick chimney is located at the rear of the church.

In addition to the bell, the 1921 cornerstone, a wooden lecturn, and ornate pedestal, all used in the frame church, were moved to the newer brick church.

A cemetery is located behind the church.



The Church of God of Anderson is named for their affiliation with the Anderson, Indiana, congregation. The Gambrills congregation was formed in 1918 and the small frame church was dedicated in 1921. It is significant as a relatively unaltered version of the small, rural church.
