The area known as Jackson Grove, just north of Odenton, is historically significant as the site of Methodist camp meetings which were held annually during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The camp meeting movement was part of a religious movement throughout the country which gained in popularity during the late 19th century with the rise of the Chautauqua Society in New York. These religious camp meetings offered social, educational and spiritual instruction. Some associations, as in Chautauqua, N.Y., and Mountain Lake Park, Md., established permanent communities with cottages, halls, pavilions, and recreational facilities. However, numerous associations, such as the Jackson Grove Camp Meeting Association of Maryland and the District of Columbia, purchased land for temporary camp meetings held annually, where worshippers lived in tents in large shaded areas or groves. Based on a field inspection of this site, there appear to be no standing structures that survive from this past land use. Archeological evidence would presumably be minimal. This farm may date from the same period as when this area was used for camp meetings. The buildings are of average significance architecturally.


