Fluharty's Folly is located near the historic village of Kingsville in the Eleventh District of Baltimore County. The Sidney Atlas of 1850 indicates that the community of Upper Falls, sited at the intersection of Bradshaw Road and Raphel Road was just beginning to take shape in the mid-19th century.(1) The Sidney Atlas denotes J.C. Perry at this location. Between 1850 and 1877, a Methodist Episcopal church, general store, and school were constructed at the center of the community. The village to the west, known as Kingsville, gained a few more dwellings and a Lutheran Church were erected along Belair Road to the south with its intersection with Joppa Road. The land to the southeast of Kingsville developed separately and became Upper Falls Post Office.(2) According to the Hopkins Atlas of 1877, this dwelling was the residence of someone named Sweitzer. Upper Falls, which developed as a quick pace, reached a population of 100 in 1881 and was home to a rectory, school, general store, undertaker and two churches in addition to the numerous dwellings that were centered on the intersection of Bradshaw and Franklinville Roads.(3) By 1915, the community of Upper Falls was thriving, having expanded outside its previous borders and developing a greater building density at the main crossroads.(4) The 1915 Bromley Atlas denotes the Sweitzer Estate at this location.

This vernacular dwelling, built circa 1800, is sited near the road on a sloping, grassy lot among mature trees and shrubs. The five-bay, two-and-a-half-story dwelling has a full story solid random rubble stone foundation. The upper stories are either wood frame or log clad with wood weatherboards. There are center entries on the first and second stories, both featuring one-leaf wood vertical board doors. The house features 6-light casement windows, 8-light awnings, and 6/6 double hung sash windows. The first story windows have wood lug lintels and the second story windows are set in wood square-edge surrounds and have thin wood sills. The three-bay, two-story porch has a shed roof supported on square wood posts. The house has overhanging eaves, a boxed wood cornice and is topped by a side gable roof covered with asphalt shingles and pierced by two interior-end brick corbeled chimneys with hoods. Associated with this property are two historic buildings, one non-historic buildings, and one non-historic structure. The one-and-a-half-story random rubble stone garage was built circa 1940.

The one-and-a-half-story random rubble stone garage was built circa 1940. The northeast elevation features a roll-up wood paneled door and wood weatherboards in the front gable peak. The southeast elevation contains one dormer with 6/6 light double-hung wood sash window. The building has revealed rafters and a gable roof with asphalt shingles. The one-bay, three-bay, wood frame shed is clad with weatherboards and has wood corner boards. There is one center entry with a vertical board door and 6-light casement windows. The side gable roof has exposed rafters and is covered with asphalt shingles.

The non-historic shed, built circa 1980, is clad with vertical boards and features an off-center gable roof with asphalt shingles. The brick patio (circa 1990) is supported by a brick parged foundation features wood posts supporting a pyramidal roof.

The house at 11944 Jerusalem Road is located near the historic village of Kingsville in the Eleventh District of Baltimore County. The Eleventh District is known for its fertile soil, fruit and vegetable production, and waterpower that is abundant along Little Gunpowder Falls. Replacing an earlier structure at its location, this Gothic Revival dwelling was constructed circa 1868.

The Sidney Atlas of 1850 indicates that the community of Upper Falls, sited at the intersection of Bradshaw Road and Raphel Road was just beginning to take shape in the mid-19th century.(1) The Sidney Atlas denotes J.C. Perry at this location. Between 1850 and 1877, a Methodist Episcopal church, general store, and school were constructed at the center of the community. 
