Wight and Highland's Store is located in Marble Hill, Baltimore County, Maryland at the northwest corner of the junction of Shawan and York Roads. The store sits at the base of a small hill and faces east towards York Road. Built in 1878 and sheathed in wooden German siding on a coursed rubble foundation, the frame store consists of three sections: the main section is a 2½-story gable-fronted structure, rectangular in plan with a symmetrical facade and a one-story front perch; to the north is a one-story, one-bay wide addition, rectangular in plan, which runs one-half the depth of the main building; to the south is a one-story, three-bay wide addition, rectangular in plan which runs the entire depth of the main section. The store is Victorian in style and its roof is covered with standing seam metal roofing.

Wight and Highland's Store is significant as a good example of the general store commonly built in Maryland crossroads during the fourth quarter of the nineteenth century. The building is a significant visual landmark standing prominently in the crossroads village of Marble Hill and has been in continuous use as a retail store since its construction.

### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Wight and Highland's Store is located in Marble Hill, Baltimore County, Maryland at the northwest corner of the junction of Shawan and York Roads. The store sits at the base of a small hill and faces east towards York Road.

Built c. 1880 and sheathed in wooden German siding on a coursed rubble foundation, the frame store consists of three sections: the main section is a 2½-story gable-fronted structure, rectangular in plan with a symmetrical facade and a one-story front porch; to the north is a one-story, one-bay wide addition, rectangular in plan, which runs one-half the depth of the main building; to the south is a one-story, three-bay wide addition, rectangular in plan which runs the entire depth of the main section. Sitting directly west of the store is a 1½-story, four-bay wide garage/stable structure that is built into the side of a hill. It has a gable roof running north to south and the exterior is also covered with German siding. Roofs on both the store and the garage/stable are covered by standing seam metal roofing.

The principal (east) facade of the main section is fronted by a one-story, 3-bay wooden porch with raised panel detailing in the central bay. Two projecting bay windows flank the store entrance which consists of a modern glass door surmounted by a modern 2-light transom and featuring a modern 3-light sidelight to the south. The second story is two bays wide and contains two semi-circular arched windows with wooden sash and trefoil tracery. The attic story is punctuated by a porthole window, and wooden brackets support the projecting eaves of the roof.

The north facade of the main section has no fenestration on the first story and has two windows of double-hung wooden sash with 4/4 lights on the second story. There is a small, rectangular opening, boarded up with wood, also on the second story in the northwest corner under the eaves. The rear, or west, facade of the main section features a transomed central entrance on the first story surmounted by a shed-roofed hood. To the south of the entrance is a window covered and closed with a pair of paneled shutters. The second story, originally three bays wide, has two paired windows with double hung wooden sash and 4/4 lights. To the extreme south is the ghost of a third window opening. The second story of the south facade also has a rectangular opening boarded up with wood in the southwest corner under the eaves in addition to a paired

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

SIGNIFICANCE

Wight and Highland's Store is significant as a good example of the general store commonly built in Maryland crossroads during the fourth quarter of the nineteenth century. The building is a significant visual landmark standing prominently in the crossroads village of Marble Hill and has been in continuous use as a retail store since its construction in 1878.

HISTORY AND SUPPORT

The crossroads village of Marble Hill developed in the last quarter of the nineteenth century as a result of its strategic location at the junction of Western Run Turnpike (now Shawan Road) and York Turnpike (now York Road). Both turnpikes were heavily traveled in the late 1800's and early 1900's by persons transporting goods north to York, Pennsylvania or south to Baltimore. Western Run Turnpike, in operation from 1867 to 1918, located one of its tollgates (no longer extant) on the south side of Shawan Road near York Road. In addition to servicing these toll roads, Marble Hill became a community for people working in the nearby marble quarries and iron ore mines. Today Marble Hill consists of about 16 buildings erected primarily between 1880 and 1900; of the six buildings identified on the Hopkins 1877 Atlas of Baltimore County, only two remain.

The July 27, 1878 issue of the Maryland Journal announced on page 3, the opening of this general store in Marble Hill:

IMPROVEMENTS NEAR COCKEYSVILLE...The spirit of improvement has taken hold this spring. Mssrs. Wright (sic) and Leutz have built a fine large store on York Turnpike, above Cockeysville for the general accommodation of the country trade, keeping dry goods, groceries & c. Adjoining the store they

window and a single window, both double-hung with 1/1 wooden sash. An interior-wall brick chimney pierces the eastern-most end of the roof.

The east facade of the southern one-story addition features a central entrance flanked by two all-glass display windows which were formed by enclosing part of a one-story porch running the width of the addition. The porch is supported by modern, square wooden posts and features a vertical tongue-and-groove sided frieze that is punctuated by a multi-light window over the entrance. Rising from the porch roof is a one-half story parapet. The rear (west) facade of this addition has a central, double hung wooden window with 4/4 lights. To the south of the window is a square opening with louvred vents. The south facade has no fenestration and displays three equally-spaced wooden pilasters resting on concrete piers. A wooden gutter at the eave is accented with a simple wooden cornice.

The east facade of the northern one-story addition has a central window, hidden by a pair of panelled shutters. Above the first story roof line, a single sash window of 6 lights punctuates the eastern wall of an enclosed staircase which rises from the interior of this addition to the second story of the main section. The north facade also has a centrally placed window covered and closed with a pair of wooden panelled shutters. The rear (west) facade has an entrance to the south topped with a shed-roofed hood. It is flanked to the north by a window closed with a pair of wooden panelled shutters.

The interior of the main section, originally one large room rectangular in plan, is now composed of two, almost square rooms which are nearly equal in size and are separated by a partition wall running from north to south. The partition wall is made of thin, painted plywood while the other walls and the ceiling are simply plastered. The floor in both rooms is comprised of random width pine; wooden moldings have a simple, rectangular profile,

The eastern room of the main section has an entry to the southern addition in the southeast corner. Another entry in the northwest corner leads to the western room of the main section. A chimney flue is located in the southeast corner of the eastern room and the original front door in the east wall has been replaced by a modern, all-glass commercial door. There are two chamfered posts, equidistant from each other and the north and south walls, which support

two beams running east to west overhead. The western room of the main section features an arched entry to the southern addition in the southeast corner. A door and window in the western wall have been boarded up; a six-paneled wooden door is located on the north wall in the northeast corner. Two trap doors, which also serve as part of the floor in the center of this room, open to reveal wooden steps leading to the basement. There are two chamfered posts in the middle of this room and two next to the partition wall, which also support the two beams running from east to west overhead.

The southern addition is composed of one large room, rectangular in plan. The interior is sheathed in modern paneling, has a suspended, acoustical ceiling and moldings with a simple, rectangular profile. The original front door in the east wall has also been replaced with an all-glass commercial door. Wall-to-wall commercial grade carpeting covers the random-width pine floors.

The northern addition, rectangular in plan, has plaster walls and ceiling. The flooring is comprised of random-width pine. Windows in the north, south and east walls, as well as the door in the west wall, have been boarded up. The flight of stairs along the east wall is characterized by a square handrail and square balusters. Moldings in this room are also simple and rectangular in profile.

A full Basement runs under the main section only and has a rubble foundation and a crushed rock floor. Wooden posts, set on one-foot thick stone piers, support 12" x 8" floor joists. Two circular tin shutes located overhead in the floor boards, a non-operative gas jet near the stair, and a variety of hooks and pegs attached to the joists suggest that the basement was used for storage purposes. The north wall of the basement has several rectangular window openings which are now closed and hidden from view on the outside by dirt which covers the entire foundation wall. These windows suggest that the north wall may have been partially exposed at one time.

The second story and attic were not accessible for inspection.

The principal (east) facade of the garage/stable has an entrance on the southernmost end. It is flanked on the north by double sliding crossbuck doors topped with single

light wooden sash. The two northernmost bays are filled in with wooden German siding. The north facade has a single sash 6-light casement window; the west and south facades have no fenestration.

have built a large and commodious warehouse for the storage of grain, agricultural implements, etc.

The Wright referred to is either John J. Wight, on whose land the store was built, or his son William H. Wight to whom John J. Wight leased the land in 1880 (Baltimore County Land Records, Liber 116, folio 494). William H. Wight had some previous experience in keeping a grocery store because he is listed in the 1878 Baltimore City Directory as a dealer in dried fruits. The 1880 census shows A.J. Lentz (sic) as running a general store and lists two boarders living with him, one of whom is Martin A. Hyland, shown as a clerk in the store. Sometime prior to 1898, Leutz left the business and Hyland and Wight became partners, operating under the name of "Wight and Highland" even though Wight retained the leasehold. In 1919, Wight conveyed the leasehold to Hyland (liber 515, folio 446) who continued to operate the store for five more years. The store was then purchased in 1924 by Benjamin Aiken, who owned it until his death six years later (liber 584, folio 376). Jack and Mary Pinkner purchased the store from Aiken's widow in 1959 (liber 3519, folio 376) and the business became known as Pinkner's Department Store. Its present use as an outdoor equipment store known as "Appalachian Outfitters" began in 1978 after the current owner, Stefani Obchran, purchased the building from Pinkner's heirs (liber 5900, folio 513).

The additions were added sometime prior to 1918 because the Baltimore County Tax Records of 1918 describe the main building and additions with their current dimensions.






