The L. Painter House is located at 18918 Gunpowder Road in the town of Beckleysville in the Fifth District of Baltimore County. Although an exact date of construction for the dwelling has not been determined, architectural evidence and historic maps support a circa 1875 date. At the time that the house was constructed, Beckleysville was the largest and most important town in the Fifth District, having a population of 400 in 1881. Most of the town lies within the Fifth District; however, a portion of the east side of town lies in the Sixth District. Industry in the town was focused around the Beckley Paper Mills, which were located to the south of the crossroads on Gunpowder Road. The town was also home to two stores, Zouck's Hotel, Public School No. 8, a Lutheran and a Methodist Episcopal church, and the Knights of Pythias Union Lodge No. 50. The 1898 Bromley Atlas indicates that L. Painter occupied the house.

This Cottage Gothic Revival dwelling faces east and is sited on a sloping lot surrounded by several agricultural fields and mature trees. The L-shaped house is two-and-a-half stories high and five bays wide with a central entry and a one-story wrap-around porch. It sits on a solid random rubble stone foundation, and is clad with German wood siding. A double-leaf wood paneled door provides access on the façade, and is flanked by elongated 2/2 double-hung wood sash windows. The doorway is illuminated with a 1-light transom. Five 2/2 double-hung wood sash windows pierce the second-story. A center cross gable contains a round arched 2/2 double-hung wood sash window. The porch is supported with octagonal paneled wood columns with decorative scroll-sawn brackets. The cross-gable roof features overhanging eaves with scroll-sawn brackets with spindles at the corners. Three corbel-capped brick chimneys rise above the standing-seam metal roof. A one-story wood frame addition is located on the rear elevation, and sits on an 8-course American brick bond foundation and an asymmetrical gable roof. Two historic outbuildings, a stable and a shed, along with a non-historic gazebo are associated with this property.

Constructed circa 1875, this Cottage Gothic Revival dwelling faces east and is located in the small roads community of Beckleysville. It is sited on a sloping lot surrounded by several agricultural fields and mature trees. The L-shaped house is two-and-a-half stories high and five bays wide with a central entry and a one-story wrap-around porch. It sits on a solid random rubble stone foundation, and is clad with German wood siding. A double-leaf wood paneled door provides access on the façade, and is flanked by elongated 2/2 double-hung wood sash windows. The doorway is illuminated with a 1-light transom. Five 2/2 double-hung wood sash windows pierce the second-story. A center cross gable contains a round arched 2/2 double-hung wood sash window. The porch is supported with octagonal paneled wood columns with decorative scroll-sawn brackets. The cross-gable roof features overhanging eaves with scroll-sawn brackets with spindles at the corners. Three corbel-capped brick chimneys rise above the standing-seam metal roof. A one-story wood frame addition is located on the rear elevation, and sits on an 8-course American brick bond foundation and an asymmetrical gable roof.

Two historic outbuildings, a stable and a shed, along with a non-historic gazebo are associated with this property. The stable, constructed circa 1920, stands one-and-a-half stories high and is two bays wide. It is clad with board-and-batten siding and capped with a side-gable roof covered with standing-seam metal. The two vertical board wood single-leaf doors provide access to the stables. Two vented cupolas are seen on the roof, and the roof on south elevation is overhanging. Located to the rear of the house is a circa 1940 wood frame shed one story high and one bay wide. It stands on a poured concrete foundation and is constructed of a mixed 11 and 12-course American bond. The door is a single-leaf of vertical boards, and the shed roof is clad with standing-seam metal. A shed addition is located on the rear elevation. The non-historic circa 1960 wood frame gazebo stands on a poured concrete foundation and is clad with lattice. The pyramidal roof is covered with wood shingles.

The L. Painter House is located at 18918 Gunpowder Road in the town of Beckleysville in the Fifth District of Baltimore County. Although an exact date of construction for the dwelling has not been determined, architectural evidence and historic maps support a circa 1875 date. The house first appears on the 1877 Hopkins Atlas, where it is located just to the north of the crossroads of Gunpowder and Beckleysville Roads. At the time that the house was constructed, Beckleysville was the largest and most important town in the Fifth District, having a population of 400 in 1881.¹ Most of the town lies within the Fifth District; however, a portion of the east side of town lies in the Sixth District. Industry in the town was focused around the Beckley Paper Mills, which were located to the south of the crossroads on Gunpowder Road. The town was also home to two stores, Zouck's Hotel, Public School No. 8, a Lutheran and a Methodist Episcopal church, and the Knights of Pythias Union Lodge No. 50. The 1898 Bromley Atlas indicates that L. Painter occupied the house.


