This log house, located on the northwest side of Stringtown Road between Falls and Yeoho Roads, may have been a tenant house or the home of a farmer of modest means.

The property on which it stands was called Fair Play and was part of the lands laid out for George Chilcoat in 1789. Thomas Cole purchased it in 1838 and probably erected this dwelling shortly thereafter. It appears on the 1850 map of Baltimore County as the home of Isaac Griffith and on the 1877 Atlas as belonging to Levi Naylor. It has been altered several times during the late-nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Glikin House is a log house, two storeys in height, three bays in length, facing south, with a frame rear or north wing two storeys in height, two bays in length. A one-storey hipped roof porch extends across the south front and one-storey shed-roofed porches flank the rear wing. The log structure which measures 16 by 24 feet, probably dates from the second quarter of the 19th century with the rear wing, weatherboard exterior finishes and lathe and plaster interior finishes added late in the 19th century. Neither a chimney large enough for a fireplace nor the evidence of the same is apparent, which suggests a date close to mid-century or later. All floor joists are of logs and roof rafters are a mixture of logs and straight-sawn members mitered at the ridge; open shingle lathe is attached with cut nails. Chinking between logs is of small flattish stones laid diagonally in mortar, their internal faces roughly plastered. Thick layers of white and pink wash are on the log joists, an area covered by lathe and plaster late in the 19th century, now removed.

The middle bay in the first storey of the south front contained two doors; the westerly opening is now a window. 1/1 windows are in other bays throughout. Exterior walls are covered with German siding, the gables with wood shingles. Single-flue chimneys rise externally at the west and north ends.

The main house consists of two equally-sized rooms in each storey, the dividing partition being of straight-sawn studs with circular-sawn wood lathe fastened with cut nails.

The northeast porch was enclosed in the 20th century as a kitchen and another similar porch was added to its east side, in turn, connecting a frame well house which probably dates from the early 20th century.
