RANDY SHELLEY HOUSES

Before 1833

— MARYLAND LINE

PRIVATE

This structure was originally two distinct houses on separate lots, the northern half serving as a store down to about 1915. The southern half was built by John Riley. In the 1940s, the parts were reworked into a single unit, now covered with white composition shingles. Style is vernacular; the roof is gabled and there is a low, full-width front porch with a few scroll brackets on the posts supporting the porch roof. Since 1977, it has belonged to Randolph H. Shelley, whose name was assigned to the house.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The "Randy Shelley Houses" as this single structure was named in the MHT Inventory in 1977 is composed of two log houses that stood close to each other, but were in the 1940s reworked into a single house when under one ownership. The house has been covered with white composition shingles, and the roofing material is unified, showing no bulges between the older segments. The house is now a duplex six bays wide, sharing a single four-bay, shed-roofed, front porch. Each half-house has a central entrance, flanked by a pair of 6-over-6 double-hung sash windows.

At second-story level, there are only four bays, the windows located directly over those at first-floor level. The one chimney, an inside type, is off center, rising through the front roof, flush with the roadside facade of the house; it is positioned just left of (or north) of the inner window of the north duplex.

A very plain wood cornice runs across the main facade. The eaves are only slightly overhung, without returns.

The south end-wall is punctuated by two small, square, 4-pane windows in the gable ends; at the rear of the house at first-story level, there is a single 1-over-1 double-hung sash window.

The front porch is supported by five plain wooden posts. The posts have decorative braces that reach out to join the brace from the opposite post; the braces are linked by small, scroll-sawn bracketing. The porch is concrete, only few inches higher than the pavement. Windows are without shutters.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The "Randy Shelley Log Houses" consist of two distinct structures, once on separate lots, but closely spaced and in recent years joined into one fabric by changes executed in the 1940s.

The northern half was _____'s store (the name is illegible) on the 1850 map and this small parcel sold for \$800 in 1852 when William Sykes conveyed to John Fife and Elihu Hendrix; it sold for \$1000 in 1856 when Benjamin F. Jordan conveyed to Clement Standiford. (1) In 1859, Clement Standiford tried to escape his creditors by conveying to John Standiford for \$1.00 but the court declared that deed null and void. (2) The \$1 transaction included a bill of sale for a dwelling house, stone stable, sheds, slaughter house, corn crib, and the storeroom containing goods consisting of clothes, cassimeres, satinets, muslins, calico, lawns, worsted goods, dry goods, groceries, cans, boxes, and barrels ... hardware, tinware, glassware ... essences and medicines ... all on a quarter acre. The court ordered the place sold and it passed to John Chrystal, the mortgage-holder, via Owen McGoldrick in 1864. (3) The Chrystal property was sold at auction in 1891 to William T. Hendrix, who was shown with a storehouse and dwelling combined in the 1911 tax ledger. (4) Mrs. A. K. Hendrix was listed as general storekeeper at Maryland Line in the 1915 Polk Directory. (5) Dimensions were 17 by 45 and 20 by 36 in the 1918 tax ledger. (6) Hendrix lost the place for 1932 taxes and it passed to Everett A. Bohlayer via the county treasurer (1937), to Sarah F. Holloway (1940), to John C. Holloway by will, and in 1977 to Randolph H. Shelley, who carried out extensive repairs. (7)

The southern half was on a quarter acre acquired by John Riley in 1833, and the 1833 Assessment valued his house at \$100. (8) On his death in 1852, the house was valued at \$225, but his executors only got \$175 for it at public sale. (9) Riley was a widower and his son, Joseph, had vanished in California. He had only \$7.50 in possessions and \$205 "debts on his books" but no store goods or implements of business. (10) William Sykes bought the place at auction in 1852; two years


later, Sykes got \$1650 for this property when he sold to William Standiford; the Riley house may have been much expanded or totally replaced. (11) In 1884, when the administrator of Isaac Amos sold to John Standiford, the dwelling was specifically mentioned and Standiford was its occupant. (12) A plat of village tracts in 1880 showed I. Amos here, with Mrs. Crystal (sic) on the lot to the north. (13) In 1896, Lavinia E. Peddicord became owner, then Henry N. and Pearl Blanche Spicer in 1904; Thomas J. Hunter, 1905; Annie E. Gosnell, 1906, and then Howard T. Standiford, who is shown with a quarter acre in the 1918 tax ledger and a house measuring 16 x 28 feet in the two-story portion and 16 by 20 in the one-story part. (14) Wilford Standiford became owner in 1943, and in 1948, Thomas L. and Sarah E. Holloway (who already owned the structure to the north). (15) John Holloway inherited the place and sold both halves to Randolph H. Shelley and wife in 1977.
