DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

323 Lennox Ave.

This attractive house is of a later style than most of the others on Lennox Ave. Its plan consists of a stair hall and one room at the front of the main two story section, with one room behind this and a one story room on the right. The front porch roof wraps around the corner to roof this room in one continuous structure. There is a one story shed addition to the rear. The front porch is semi-closed, with fat square posts running from the enclosure to the roof. A cellar under the porch is finished with glass blocks and concrete blocks shaped to imitate stone.

The front door, at the left, is topped by a single-pane transom. A window made of two connected 6/6 sash windows is to the right, and an identical window in its rear wall, and four connected 6/6 windows along its side. Two double 6/6 sash windows light the front of the second floor and a single 6/6 sash window lights the attic. One 6/6 dormer window projects from the left-hand roof slope. All the windows are framed with unmolded boards.

The front gable has a small pent running across it, strengthening its dimented appearance. The house is sheathed in grey asbestos shingles. A fireplace is located in the right-hand wall of the main front room. A large square newel stands at the foot of the stairs.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This property is part of the land originally owned by Benjamin Payne and was later conveyed to Lester Maddox and Emma Maddox on August 18, 1885. It was then conveyed to John J. Yellot who subdivided the tract into individual lots in 1905. The earliest recorded owner after Yellot, was Alverta Johnson and George Rachel Scott in 1924. However, the 1915 map indicates that the house did exist at that period, it was owned by the family of George Scott. After fifty years of living in the house it was then conveyed to Emory Scott, son of George, who later married Mary Terell; she presently owns the structure.

Local History indicates that Alverta Johnson was the ex-wife of Mr. Willie Johnson, who built this particular house.
