DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE	
<p>The TINSLEY HOUSE is a two storey stone house, assymetrical in plan, with steeply pitched hipped roofs covered with slate, built in 1956-57, one wing--the west--incorporating the stone walls of a very plain three bay rubble stone farmhouse. The style of the present house is based on the rural farmhouses of Northern France.</p> <p>The garage just north of the house, connected to the latter by a roof above the driveway, incorporates earlier walls of a meat house; its roof is also a steeply-pitched hip and it is embellished with an octagonal louvred cupola.</p> <p>The Guest Cottage incorporates late Medieval French details.</p> <p>The massive frame barn, characteristically, is built into the hillside northeast of the house, the south side of its tall upper storey extending over the stone lower storey, sheltering the doors and windows to the stalls within. Exterior walls of the tall loft or upper storey are covered with horizontal siding and tall panels of louvres are paired beneath slightly raking trim provide ventilation.</p> <p>A wooden pump, beneath an octagonal bell-shaped roof supported by square unadorned columns with diagonal braces, stands between the barn and the house.</p> <p>Under the hill west of the house is a stone spring house, its spring outside its north end wall sheltered by the cantilevered gable roof above, rising above a few feet of log construction on the stone walls.</p>

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Tinsley house belongs to the 20th century period of careful renditions of period European architecture, deliberately designed to be picturesque. In its present form, the house and guest house were designed by the Baltimore architectural firm of Wrenn, Lewis and Jencks in 1956-57.

The early portion of the house, the west wing, was a stone farmhouse built in mid-19th century, probably by the Fowble family who occupied the property until 1884. Charlotte Fowble, wife of John T. Fowble, inherited the farm from her father, Stephen Gill, who was prominent in the area and served as a Captain in the War of 1812.

The spring house and barn relate to the Fowble farm. The barn is typical of most barns in this district, large and built into the hillside facing south. The spring house is a survivor of the many small outbuildings once required to support rural life.
