DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

406 MAIN STREET

406 Main Street is a three bay, two storey, gable roofed brick house facing the street to the east. It has a two bay, two storey gable roofed brick and frame kitchen wing extending behind its north end. A vertical joint in the common-bond brickwork of the street or east facade indicates that the two narrower northerly bays and the wider southerly bay were constructed at different times. The brick wall through the house behind this joint has been removed in its entirety but remaining portions of its foundation in the cellar indicate that the northerly bays are the original. The northerly half of the rear wing is of brick, the southerly of frame. The absence of a vertical joint between the main house and the rear wing indicates that the brick portion of the wing is part of the original house, dating from ca. 1850; the south wing probably was added within twenty years.

All windows are 6/6, set into narrow frames and flanked by louvred blinds. Exposed wood lintels support the masonry above. The recessed entrance in the middle bay of the east front has a modern wooden surround of the Tuscan order. The cornice is of corbeled brick and flush chimneys rise above each gable; the chimney of the rear wing has been removed.

Within, a stair hall extends through the central bay and a single room is on either side. The stair has paneled newels, moulded rail and square balusters, all dating from the early twentieth century. Door and window trim is plain, with raked heads. The south mantel has plain pilasters supporting a plain frieze; the north mantel is missing and the fireplace is closed. The second storey is similar and the two original doors remain, each with two tall, full-length panels and BALDWIN PATENT hinges.

In the cellar the original kitchen fireplace remains in the rear wing as does the hearth framing for one above, now removed. A stairwell is framed in the northeast corner of the rear wing, perhaps the only original stair.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

406 MAIN STREET

One of several small traditional mid-nineteenth century houses with a front parlor facing the street and a kitchen behind in the rear wing. In this instance, the kitchen was in the basement, yielding another room on the principal floor and the brick construction indicates substance. This example was lengthened to the south at an early date, the vertical joint in the street front marking the extent of the original house.

The house is built on land which John Reister I deeded to his eldest daughter, Catherine in 1793 (WG No.LL:216). Her first husband was Roland Smith, Jr. a merchant who conducted the first store in Reisterstown on his father-in-law's property south of the Reister Inn. He died very shortly in 1781. In 1783, Catherine was married a second time to Francis Mayberry. (Marks op cit., p. 53-54) Dr. Dickson, in his account, says that "Mr. Mayberry continued the store, but did not live many years, and also died on this place..." (Dickson, op cit., p.7) After the death of her second husband, Catherine managed the store, perhaps assisted by her son, John Smith. In 1793, John Reister deeded her the two acres on which the shop was located, the property to descend to her daughters. (WG No.LL:216) The property is described in the Federal Assessment of 1798 (No.3215) but is no longer standing. (Marks, op cit p54)

Catherine carried on her shop in Reisterstown on this site for many years. Dr. Dickson mentions that "The lot on which Mrs. Katy Mayberry resided and died, contained from 1/2 to 3/4 acre of land and finally fell into the hands of Mr. John Sumwalt, who afterwards built a fine brick house on the same lot, and then deeded it to the Methodist Episcopal Church as a Parsonage". (Dickson, op cit., p. 6) Prior to this, her store was described in a magazine article as "an old tottering shamble where Aunt Kitty Mayberry peddled cakes, candy and mead to the children..". According to a local tradition, she became very nearsighted in her later life and was teased by village children who attempted to pass off bogus money for her penny candies" (Md. Monthly Magazine, op. cit., p. 9-13 and Marks, op cit., p. 54)

After Catherine's death her property was divided among her three daughters. In 1841, one of these, Elizabeth Mayberry DeCoursey, deeded her share to John Sumwalt (TK 314/419-21) He had married her sister, Margaret Smith. A tanner, by trade, Sumwalt was prosperous. By 1808 he owned most of Reister's Desire on the west side of the turnpike. He eventually became one of the "largest land owners in the area". (Marks op cit., p.55) He was appointed Justice of the Peace in 1820.

Statement of Significance

He subscribed to the building fund of St. Johns Episcopal Church in Worthington Valley and in 1824 he deeded a piece of his property to the trustees of the High German Lutheran Church. In 1824, he deeded the trustees of the school house in Reisterstown a lot on Cockey's Mill Road as a school site, and in 1826 was appointed a member of the Board of trustees for the newly created Franklin Academy built there. (Marks op cit., p. 55-56)

After purchasing his sister-in-law's share of the Mayberry lot in 1841, he built the "fine brick house" on it- the present structure. He died in 1847, and the house and lot were conveyed to the Methodist as a parsonage (B.C.Wills DMP No.21, 1845-47;481-85)

The Methodist Church has maintained this parsonage until July, 1978. It was recently auctioned off to a private individual.
