

## GERMAN HOUSE

Finding its roots in the central pediment the "cross-gable" is an architectural element that enjoyed particular popularity in America during most of the 19th century and at least a quarter of the 20th century. It can be found on residences, barns, stores and factories as early as the 1830's and as late as the 1930's. Studies in some sections of Maryland for this period show as many as 50% to 60% of the structures in a given area to have been cross-gables.

This town was no exception and there are at least twenty residences still standing in central Towson (Nov., 1977) to prove the fact.

The German Houses and the Chew house on the northwest corner of Shealey and Virginia Aves. are important not only as individual examples of this stylistic tradition but also as components of what was a continuous streetscape of cross-gable facades.

**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

This house consists of a main block that is three bays wide and one deep with an off center 1' X 1' projection to the rear (north). The entire building is two stories in height plus an attic. This is a wooden frame construction resting on a high cement foundation. The exterior is covered with shingles.

The south facade faces Shealey Ave. and is the main facade. It has a full porch covering the first story and it is characterized by the cross-gable. This latter feature accentuates the fact that this building is centralized in its plan. The entrance occupies the central bay but there is no central hall. The entrance is flanked by a bay on either side which contains a large 1/1 window. The door itself has a two-light transom. The decorative details of this facade include the short and slender doric columns that support the porch roof between it and the railing. The sides of the porch contain shingles identical to those covering the rest of the house. The spaces in between the brick piers are filled with green wooden lattice. The tongue-and-groove ceiling is painted the traditional sky-blue.

The cross-gable is of the add-on variety and is vented by a 1/1 round arch sash window.

A deep cornice projects c. 15 inches out from the building and adds emphasis to the gable-ends of the roof by giving them a pediment-like appearance. Both end gables have round arch windows. The roof is covered with gray slate and has metal "snow guards."

The north wing is as tall as the main block and so is the kitchen wing. It occupies almost half of the west bay but does not reach either corner. This wing has regular fenestration like the rest of the house although the 1/1 sash are smaller. The east ell contains a small shed roofed porch covering an entrance.

A flue-chimney exits the building in a central location where the kitchen wing intersects the main block.


